

CLIMBS BNAK Turns Turtle, But Causes Injury To Nobody

Automobile, Driven by Harper Stricker, Breaks From Driver's Control—Child Carries News of Plight to Bladensburg

Martinsburg, August 15—An automobile party figured in a miraculous escape from serious injury near here Monday night about 11 o'clock when the machine in which Harper Stricker of Howard and Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Ashcraft and child were riding turned turtle.

The party was going from Utica to Stricker's home and Stricker, who was driving the car, lost control of the machine at a point where there is a steep bank on each side of the road. The automobile climbed up the bank and turned completely over.

The occupants of the car were thrown out and badly bruised and shaken up, but no one was seriously injured.

The little Ashcraft child was badly frightened and ran to Bladensburg, crying and calling for help. A number of men went to the scene of the accident and the car was soon righted.

The steering gear, windshield and one axle of the machine were broken.
