

FOUR BANDS TO PLAY FOR HOME COMING JULY 4

General Committee Holds A Meeting On Tuesday Evening

OVER \$1,000 IS SUBSCRIBED NOW

Committee Desires All Men To Wear Uniforms On That Day

It was decided at the meeting of

the general committees of the "Welcome Home Day" celebration, which will be held in this city on July 4 in honor of every person in Knox county who at one time or another served their country, to meet every Tuesday evening from now until the celebration.

Chairman Guy Taylor of the finance committee announced that \$1100 has been collected for the celebration and that it is estimated that \$1500 can be collected before the event. Mr. Taylor has started work preparing a budget and the money collected will be divided among the entertainment, music, decorating and banquet committees.

The music committees will probably have four bands, including Garfield Snow's band and a band from Columbus; the union organizations will supply a band from Zanesville and the K. of P. lodge will also furnish a band.

The G. A. R. rifle and drum corps will also take part.

It is the desire of the committee that every man who has had any service in any branch to save his uniform and wear it at the celebration.

Several prominent speakers will be obtained to make addresses.

It is desired that everybody in Knox county come to Mt. Vernon on July 4 and take part in the celebration. It is very likely that special trains will be used to bring the out-of-town crowds into the city.

COURT NEWS

The last will and testament of David Bulyer, late of Middlebury township, was filed for probate Wednesday morning. By the terms of the will the testator gives to his wife, Amanda Bulyer, the entire income from his estate, both real and personal. At her death all the property goes to the testator's son, Herbert Bulyer. The son is named as the executor. The will was signed February 13, 1904, in the presence of L. B. Ackerman and Ernest V. Ackerman.

Della Baker has commenced an injunction suit in the court of common pleas of Knox county against the city of Mt. Vernon and C. G. Hunt, treasurer of Knox county.

He alleges that he has been assessed the sum of \$528 for his share of the pavement and sewer on East Burgess street. The plaintiff alleges that he has been taxed on the tax duplicate for that sum and that the defendant, C. G. Hunt, is about to force the collection of the sum. He asks for an injunction restraining the defendant from proceeding with the collection of the assessment for the reason that the amount is entirely too large and excessive. NURSES FINISH HOSPITAL WORK AND GRADUATE

Five Awarded Diplomas At The Graduating Exercises

INTERESTING ADDRESS BY ELDER ASHTON

Exercises Were Held At The Baptist Church Monday Night

The commencement exercises of the graduating nurses of the Mt. Vernon hospital were held at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening at the First Baptist church.

Five persons, Miss Marion Saxton of Indiana, Pa., Miss Dillah Watt of Indiana, Pa., Mr. Ludwig Lutz of Madison, Wis., Miss Phoebe Patterson of Akron, O., and Miss Esther Wagner of Mt. Vernon were graduated after three years of training.

The church was decorated with the class colors, blue and white, the color scheme being carried out with white flowers and blue crepe paper. Four nurses in uniform acted as ushers for the large crowd in attendance.

In Prof. Ashton's address, he spoke of the two pathways of life, one in which the person has lofty principles and, at the immediate time, suffers hardships, toil and unhappiness, but in the end gain the crown of achievement, while the person choosing the other pathway—that of selfishness, present joys—meets despair in the end, when they gain the crown of corruption.

He said the nurses who were graduating had now reached the parting of ways in their life, when they must choose between these two modes of living, and, having chosen that one of sacrifice, would gain the crown of happiness.

Dr. H. W. Blair, as a member of the medical association, who daily deals with nurses, presented the diplomas with a few appropriate remarks, in which he spoke of the nurse as the "ally of the doctor."
