

# ANNUAL OHIO CONFERENCE OF YOUNG PEOPLE OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL OPENS IN MT. VERNON

Sessions For Young Men And Young Women Held Friday Evening

Convention To Close Sunday Evening With A Union Service

The annual Ohio conference of older boys, older girls, and young people opened Friday night with two meetings; one for older boys and young men, at the Presbyterian church, and one for older girls and young women, at the Church of Christ.

These were preliminary meetings, with the emphasis placed upon the meaning of the conference.

**The Girls' Meeting**

After an enthusiastic song service at the girls' meeting, a scripture lesson on friendliness was read by Mrs. Mayer, the assistant state superintendent of young people.

Rev. Long, pastor of the Church of Christ, gave the address welcoming the girls to Mt. Vernon, to the heart of Ohio, and spoke of the pleasure which it gives the people of Mt. Vernon to entertain the young people's division.

The response was given by Miss Elsie Triplett of Akron, the president of the girls' conference, who then introduced Mr. Mayer, the new state superintendent of young people's work, and Mr. Alexander, who is superintendent of the international young people's division.

Mr. Alexander greeted the girls and gave a short talk on What Are You Going to Be Ten Years From Now?

He spoke of how one could tell how a girl would look in ten years if he knew what she ate, but even more particularly could one tell how a girl will look in 10 years if he knew what she was thinking about. He begged them not to lead a flower-pot life.

Miss Triplett then chose a nominating committee, a committee to prepare greetings to send to the boys' meeting and one to prepare a program of work to be done during the year.

Miss Bose, who has been at the head of the girls' work in Alabama, but who is at present working in Alabama, was next introduced.

She spoke on "Why We Are Here," explaining the work of the World Sunday School association and the international work. This conference is to give an opportunity for the girls to talk together, work together and plan together to make our Sunday school more effective, to be a place to gain inspiration, enthusiasm and information. But after it is all over, we are to remember that it is not all done, it is only said.

Mr. Mayer then introduced some of the girls who had attended the summer school at Lake Geneva, and afterwards spoke of some of the plans for the conference.

After a song, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Mrs. Curtis. It is hoped that as many of the young people as can attend will come to these meetings, for they will be welcomed, if they are not accredited delegates, and these meetings are a source of inspiration and greatly worth while.
