

EIGHT MEN UNDER THE DEATH SENTENCE

(By Associated Press to The Banner) COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 21—The number of prisoners awaiting the death sentence and the number sent in the last six months to do life terms in the Ohio penitentiary here are far above the average, according to the state board of clemency.

NEW LAW FOR HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS

(By Associated Press to The Banner) COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 21—Under new regulatory laws enacted by the last general assembly, Ohio hotels, restaurants and dry cleaning establishments will be compelled to meet the rules of the various state regulatory departments before they can obtain licenses necessary to their operation.

Fire prevention, sanitary measures, pure food laws, health and safety rules and other regulations must be met to the letter before the licenses will be granted, according to T. Alfred Fleming, state fire marshal, who is preparing a digest of the laws.

Each individual business must apply to the state fire marshal for application blanks. These will be ready in a few days. The fire marshal's department will be reorganized to meet the additional burden placed upon it by the new regulations.

DIGEST ON NEW SCHOOL LAWS

(By Associated Press to The Banner) COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 21—A pamphlet containing a digest of the 19 new laws dealing with Ohio schools and school teachers, passed by the last general assembly, has been prepared by Frank B. Pearson, state superintendent of public instruction.

Some of the new laws already are in effect and others will become operative before the reopening of the schools in the fall.

One of the new laws requires that public, private and parochial school teachers must be American citizens of good standing.

Under the Hooley act, effective July 25, all school buildings in Ohio must display the American flag. The Ritter act, effective Sept. 5, requires that American government and citizenship shall be taught in all seventh and eighth grades.

MANY VIOLATE THE PROHIBITION LAW

(By Associated Press to The Banner) INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 21—Since prohibition became effective in Indiana, April 2, 1918, the number of federal court indictments for alleged violation of the Reed prohibition amendment has reached a total of 937.

Those who have pleaded guilty number 577. Twenty-five others have been convicted in court, making a total of 602 violators who have been sentenced by the court.

Fines imposed by United States District Judge A. B. Anderson in the Reed amendment cases aggregate \$41,875. Jail sentences total 48 years and one month.

SHORTAGE OF COAL FACED BY ENGLISH

Coal Over 70 Million Tons Short of The Output 1913

LONDON, July 18—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—A shortage of more than 70,000,000 tons of coal, as compared with the 1913 output, is faced by Great Britain in the coming year, according to Sir Auckland Geddes, president of the Board of Trade.

Those newspapers which championed the miners in their successful fight for a shorter working day refuse to concede the claim made by pessimistic prophets that reduction in hours means a corresponding reduction in output.

Even if the amount of coal kept for home consumption is held down to the amount used last year on a strict rationing basis, 196,000,000 tons, the export surplus available will amount to 20,000,000 tons.

This is said, will have highly serious results, for not only must England's continental allies go without the coal for which they are almost entirely dependent on Great Britain, but this country itself will be tremendously handicapped by the fact that it no longer will be able to rely upon coal as a substitute in foreign trade for currency.

The increase in the price of coal for domestic consumption is variously estimated at from \$1.08 a ton by Sir Auckland Geddes to about \$3 by the manager of a Welsh iron and coal company.

Newspapers say the coal problem affects the entire national life of this country and its world position as a trader as well.

BROTHERS ARE HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

(By Associated Press to The Banner) CLEVELAND, July 18—Andrew and Patrick Kebort, the youthful bandits who yesterday shot and killed Ernest Gray, a deputy marshal, and wounded two other members of a posse at Willoughby, were today arraigned on charges of first degree murder before Justice B. E. Calaway in the Lake County jail at Painesville.

Andrew Kebort, 20, the eldest of the two brothers, waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury. Patrick, 18, pleaded not guilty and will be given a hearing Saturday afternoon.

Each were brought from the cell separately but the arraignment did not last ten minutes.

Bernard McCarthy, one of the victims, was reported near death today. George Gilmore is thought to have a fair chance to recover.
