

RECORD OF 198 IS HUNG UP BY THE R. & R. CLUB

Carl VanVoorhis Tops Rifle-men By Almost Perfect Performance at Range

FIVE MEMBERS QUALIFY FOR SOCIETY OF THE 190

Study Of Shooting Dope Shows Mixed Result; Average Under Week Before

Almost any kind of dope may be mixed as a result of the shooting done by the members of the Mt. Vernon Rifle & Revolver club at its range in the C. of C. building on Friday evening.

The best record was made by Carl Van Voorhis who hung up a real high total of 198 while there are five members of the club who shot better than 190 in the competition.

A further comparative study shows that the club average on Friday evening was 184 while a week ago it was 186. Carl Van Voorhis, who leads the club this week, greatly improved his record of the previous week making 198 as against 189.

H. L. Russell, who held second position in both events falls a point below his record of the previous week. Van Horn, who tied Russell on points, is three points under his previous record.

Russell had a shade the better of Van Horn in this week's shoot record having 15 bullseyes to his credit to 14 claimed by Van Horn.

Russell, Van Horn, McMillen and F. J. Van Voorhis continue consistently to hold membership in the society of the 190 and as such gave a sportsman's welcome to Carl Van Voorhis who climbed into the class from his 189 position of advantage last week.

E. Quidor improved his shooting by four points while Carl Stoughton and Carl Pipes each dropped two. Dr. Gray and A. B. Clark are nine and eight points below their record of May 6. S. M. Woolson, who shot with the club last evening, did not appear in the record of the week before, while R. R. Warner, who was among those present on May 6, did not shoot last evening.

Meeting with the club last evening was John S. Cole Jr., of Detroit, Mich., an arms expert of the Remington Arms Union Metallic Cartridge Co. Mr. Cole did not talk of the science of ballistics, or discourse learnedly in a highbrow fashion, but he did qualify as an all around good fellow and a genuine sportsman.

He and members of the club quickly found a basis of comradeship that was to their mutual liking and contributed to an increase of their common esteem and appreciation.

In the afternoon at the grounds of the Gun club, Mr. Cole gave an interesting exhibition of his skill with the revolver.

The records of the Rifle & Revolver club made Friday evening and on May 6 are given below, by which it is possible to compare more intelligently and with greater appreciation the shooting the members of the club are doing.

FIGURES GIVEN BY SPENCER ON TIRE CO. ASSETS

Proving his assertion in the Banner Thursday that a receiver cannot be appointed for the Knox Tire & Rubber Co., F. D. Spencer, secretary-treasurer of the company, today furnished the Banner with figures, showing the assets of the company.

Mr. Spencer asserts that the assets of a manufacturing concern, such as the tire and rubber company, are divided into two classes—quick assets and fixed assets.

Quick assets are such as raw materials and various items used in the manufacture of products that the company proposes to make.

Fixed assets represent the building and real estate of the company, machinery, tools, etc.

Mr. Spencer says that the quick assets of the company at the present time amount to \$46,499.62. He asserts that these quick assets could be converted into cash in two weeks' time.

The total amount of the indebtedness on the factory is \$39,092.48, according to the figures of Mr. Spencer.

Thus it will be shown that the quick assets of the company exceed the liabilities by \$7,407.14, according to the figures of Mr. Spencer.

Mr. Spencer claims that the fixed assets of the company, including the real estate, buildings, machinery, tools, etc., amount to \$600,295.21.

"There is absolutely no need for a receiver when the quick assets exceed the liabilities by 7,407.14," declared Mr. Spencer to the Banner today.

"Then, in addition, to the quick assets, I have shown that the fixed assets of the company are \$600,295.21, so that this talk of a receivership is bunk on the part of some irresponsible persons," Mr. Spencer said in conclusion.

Boys And Girls Have 23 Organizations With Enrollment Over 300

Plans have been made for a meeting to be held at Lock in Millford township on Saturday afternoon to organize a sewing club for the girls of the township.
