

JUDGE HOUCK GOES TO WASHINGTON C. H. Mt. Vernon Man Is To Deliver Memorial Address Before Fraternal Societies

Judge Lewis B. Houck went to Washington C. H. today where he is to deliver the annual memorial address before all the fraternal societies. The service will be held on Sunday afternoon.

On the following Sunday, Judge Houck is to deliver a similar address at Piqua, Miami county. He is in demand as a speaker upon such occasions, having more invitations to speak than it is possible for him to accept.

It is coming to be more and more of a custom in many places for fraternal organizations to join in a memorial service. It is custom in most lodge to hold such services for their dead, but in places where there are many lodges it sometimes results in conflict and embarrassment.

The arrangements are made by a committee formed of representatives of all the orders participating, and the expense is apportioned pro rata. Customarily some distinguished member of one of the orders is invited to speak.

It has not been customary for the orders in Mt. Vernon to join in such a service, but it is one that might be adopted with satisfaction and profit by them.
