

OCTOBER TERM OF HIGH COURT OPENS MONDAY

Assignment Contains Several Cases; Four Days' Session Likely

PARTITION SUIT IS FILED ON MONDAY

Clerk of Courts Gets Supply Of Copies Of The Ohio Game Laws

At 1 o'clock Monday afternoon the October term of the Knox county court of appeals convened at the courthouse with Judge Shields, Judge Patterson and Judge Houck on the bench.

Suit Is Filed— Walter M. Paazig has commenced suit against Richard C. Gardner and Rose B. Gardner in the common pleas court of Knox county.

Partition Suit— A suit in partition has been commenced in the Knox county probate court by Tellis B. Woolson and Rose M. Woolson against Eva M. Dudgeon et al.

Entry Is Filed— An entry has been filed in the common pleas court of Knox county approving the bond of Charles Ewers as receiver for Levering Brothers of Mt. Vernon and Fredericktown.

Motion Overruled— In the case of Mary Doty vs. the Logan Natural Gas & Fuel Co., the motion of the defendant to make the petition of the plaintiff more definite and certain has been overruled by Judge Blair in common pleas court.

Another Overruled— In the case of Golstein & Perlman vs. Edward L. Parker, the motion of the defendant to make the petition of the plaintiff more definite and certain, filed Aug. 16, has been overruled by Judge Blair in common pleas court.

Demurrer Sustained— A demurrer to the petition of the plaintiff has been sustained by Judge Blair in common pleas court.

Full Military Honors Paid Deceased By Members of American Legion

CUBAN IS GIVEN RELEASE FROM JAIL

Man Not Indicted By Grand Jury Permitted To Leave City On Saturday

Louis Fernandez, aged 20, a Cuban, who has been in the Knox county jail since July 17, held on a charge of burglary, was given his release Saturday afternoon.

Fernandez was arrested by a Pennsylvania railroad detective on a charge of burglarizing a box car. He was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of burglary, but the grand jury ignored the case. Consequently he was released Sunday.

Through the efforts of Probation Officer Purcell, the local chapter of the Red Cross furnished Fernandez a railroad ticket to Cleveland where the man expects to join his brother. Before leaving Saturday afternoon the officials and deputies at the court house raised a purse and presented it to Fernandez.

LOCAL MEN ARE HELD UP BY 2 MASKED THUGS

Fred G. Severns And Thomas Severns Have An Exciting Experience

REVOLVERS PRESSED AGAINST MEN'S BODY

Severns' Grit Prevented The Masked Hold-Up Men From Getting Money

A bold and daring attempt to stage a hold-up was made about 11:30 o'clock Saturday night when two masked men tried to rob Mr. Fred G. Severns, and his brother, Thomas Severns, at the rear of the Moose home on North West street.

Mr. Severns today in relating incidents in connection with the experience said that while enroute to his home from his shoe store and at a point where the rear entrance to the Moose home adjoins the sidewalk on West street, two masked men stepped out and demanded that he and his brother, Thomas, throw up their hands, and at the same time pressed revolvers against bodies of the men.

The men ran up the alley at the rear of the Heard residence and up towards Sandusky street. A call was sent for the police and Officer John French responded in a short time, but the men had made a get-away.

Mr. Fred Severns gave the officer a good description of the men and authorities think the job was attempted by local talent.

The men are described as being about 5'7" and 6 feet tall, wearing dark suits, caps and no overcoats.

HAMMOND MADE LIFE MEMBER OF CLUB

Receives Official Notice Of His Great Yield Of Corn This Season

Mr. Harvey Hammond of Union township received official notification Monday morning from the Fero Crops Department, Ohio State University, that he had been made a life member of the "100 Bushel Corn Club" of Ohio on account of his wonderful yield of corn on acres of land at his farm near Millwood.

Mr. Hammond also received official notice that his ten acres of land produced 104.1 bushels to the acre.

The 10 acres produced 107.08 bushels of shelled corn to the acre, which after the moisture had been reduced, yielded 104.1 bushels to the acre. This was the final figure for which Mr. Hammond received credit.

In addition to being admitted as a member of the famous club, Mr. Hammond will also receive a medal showing him to be the county champion and also a medal from the state. At the present time there are only 28 members of the "100 Bushel Corn Club." Mr. Hammond being the twenty-ninth member. The club has been in existence five years.

Mr. Hammond stated today that he planted his corn three feet apart and that the corn was drilled 14 inches apart in the rows.

Mr. Hammond is the first Knox county man to be admitted to the famous club.

REV. CLEELAND TO SPEAK IN TOLEDO

The Baptist denomination is inaugurating a nation-wide evangelism campaign, which in the state of Ohio will begin in the churches next November. It is the plan to have a special program of evangelism in every Baptist church in this state.

TOLEDO WILL HAVE FALL STYLE SHOW

(By Associated Press to The Banner, Toledo, O., Oct. 17—A miniature Atlantic City is what an exposition here Oct. 20 to 29, under auspices of the Retail Merchants Board of Toledo will be. It's going to be called the Atlantic City Boardwalk Exposition and Style show.

Merchants and manufacturers will display every kind of goods sold or made in Toledo. The exhibits will be housed in small stores, patterned after Atlantic City shops.

By means of scenic effects, estimated to cost more than \$25,000, the Terminal Auditorium, in which the exhibition will be held, will be transformed into a replica of Atlantic City. A section of the building will represent the "ocean," and a real sand beach and boardwalk will be laid.

Models will stage a style show along the boardwalk, and extending from it will be an illuminated glass runway. There will be street lamps and signs and traffic policemen along the aisles dividing the shops.

The executive committee of the Merchants Board is trying to get the railroads to offer reduced fares, in order to attract out-of-town visitors.
