

# COURT MATTERS WILL BE LIGHT PRESENT WEEK

**Postponement Of Jury Case Will Result In Few Court Matters**

**JUDGE BLAIR TO HEAR FEW MOTIONS**

# HOW TABLE FRUITS COME TO MT. VERNON

**Grapefruit, Oranges, Bananas, Etc., Received In Carlots By Mt. Vernon Fruit Co.**

The supplying of Mt. Vernon and adjacent territory with table fruits and vegetables in their seasons—that is the business and the service rendered by the Mt. Vernon Fruit Co., whose warehouse is located on West Gambler street.

The average person goes to his grocer and buys grape fruit, bananas, oranges, grapes, anything of almost an infinite variety of fruits without ever a thought how those fruits were brought to Mt. Vernon. For all he or she may know they may have been grown by the grocer in his own back yard. It would be, however, quite far away from the actual facts.

The Mt. Vernon Fruit Co., of which Mr. E. Di Piero is the manager, is one of 18 branches of which the wholesale house of John Amicon & Co., of Columbus, is the head and distribution center. The territory supplied by the Mt. Vernon house includes, of course, Mt. Vernon itself, every grocer in the city, with but one exception, being a customer. Out-side of Mt. Vernon the company serves that territory adjacent as far north as Millersburg and Mansfield south to Centerburg and Newark visiting these points at least once per week.

Manager Di Piero informs The Banner that his company's business justifies him in the belief, not only that the use of fruit for table steadily is growing favor and popularity, but that it is becoming quite evident that business conditions generally are improving.

The Mt. Vernon Fruit Co. employs two city salesmen, Cliff Bell and Charles Champion. It receives its shipments in carload lots, seal sweet grape fruit from Florida, oranges and lemons from California and Florida, bananas from Central America. It is really an interesting sight to see fruits in such quantities unloaded from the cars in which they have been shipped and stored in the warehouse to stay till they may be distributed to the retailer on their way to Mt. Vernon homes and tables.

Employees and workmen of the company today were busily engaged unloading a car of Florida seal sweet grapefruit, another of oranges from California, one of bananas and one of cabbage. It is a most interesting sight to see the handling of so much fruit.

In addition to a line of fruits of all kinds the Mt. Vernon Fruit Co. also handles vegetables such as cabbage, of well known and popular New York-Holland seed variety, turnips, parsnips, coconuts, lettuce, and, in fact, all manner of green stuffs for the table.

The public does not come directly and familiarly in contact with the company or its management for the reason that it is engaged exclusively in the wholesale trade and does not retail selling whatever. Through its salesmen and deliveries through a fleet of motor trucks it sells and distributes to the retailer the fruits and vegetables that find their way to the tables in Mt. Vernon homes.

# EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN IS OPENED SUNDAY

**Dr. Guy A. Lamphear Speaks To Large Audiences In M. P. Church**

**HIS TWO SERMONS ARE MUCH ENJOYED**

Yesterday morning Evangelist Guy A. Lamphear, D. D., of Evanston, Ill., opened an evangelistic campaign at the Mulberry street M. P. church. He spoke at the eleven o'clock hour on

the subject of "Intercessory Prayer" taking his text from Luke 22:44. He pleaded with the church people as well as all Christians to pray earnestly and with definite prayer. Evangelist Lamphear told the people that the campaign would be measured as to its real results by prayer. He pictured Christ Jesus on the cross and how in agony he prayed more earnestly. His message stirred the hearts of the Christian people.

Last night a crowded house greeted Evangelist Lamphear. Every available seat was taken according to the reports from the ushers. Doctor Lamphear took as his subject, "Christ the Wonderful." This discourse held the congregation spell bound. Preaching the true gospel and his convictions, Dr. Lamphear has made a very favorable impression on all that heard him last night. The crowd was the largest seen in the church in years.

Before the sermon a very spirited song service was led by Mr. H. Roe Bartle, of Lebanon, Kentucky, musical director for the Lamphear Evangelistic Campaigns. The chorus of 55 voices rendered a very fine chorus number under the direction of Mr. Bartle. The chorus is one of the finest ever gotten together in this city.

Dr. Lamphear is a college man having taken his college work at Baker University. He is also a graduate of the Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J. He spent 14 years in the pastorate but has given the past five years exclusively to evangelistic work. Dr. Lamphear's methods and messages are endorsed by the leading ministers and laymen throughout the country. Over 80 percent of Evangelist Lamphear's campaigns have been unbroken movements.

Mr. Bartle, musical director, is a graduate in Law from the University of Chattanooga, Chattanooga, Tenn., and is also a graduate in music at the Chattanooga Conservatory of Music. He has spent over five years as an evangelistic singer. During the World War Mr. Bartle was bandmaster of the 116th Inf.
