

GROSS NEGLIGENCE IS CHARGED IN DIVORCE ACTION

Ida B. Ammon Brings Suit in Common Pleas Against Clifford Ammon

MOTION OVERRULED ASKING NEW TRIAL

Property in Partition Case Is Sold At Sheriff's Sale On Saturday

Charging gross neglect and that the defendant failed to provide her with the necessities of life, Ida B. Ammon has commenced suit for divorce in the Knox county common pleas court against Clifford C. Ammon.

The plaintiff, in her petition, states they were married Nov. 23, 1921, and that no children were born to them. The plaintiff asks for an absolute divorce on the grounds of gross neglect. Dwight H. Hyatt and Clinton M. Rice are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

Motion Overruled

In the case of J. W. Tilton vs. William B. Hancock, Judge Blair in common pleas court has overruled a motion for a new trial as prayed for by the plaintiff. The court, in overruling the motion, orders judgment on the verdict, which was in the sum of \$500. The plaintiff sued the defendant for \$35,000 damages in the common pleas court for the alleged alienation of his wife's affections. The jury returned a verdict for \$500. The plaintiff filed a motion for a new trial.

Guardian Named

In the case of Elnora B. James vs. James H. Thomas Banning, Harry W. Koons has been appointed guardian ad litem of the minor children by Judge Blair of the common pleas court. The guardian has filed an answer asking the court to determine the interest of the said minors. Judge Blair has ordered an appraisement and a sale and Edward Walton, A. E. Rawlinson Jr. and C. N. Williams have been appointed appraisers.

A first and final account has been filed in probate court by Jasper Van Horn, executor of Addie Annett, showing the sum of \$5,151.78 received and the same amount paid out.

Statement Filed

A statement in lieu of account has been filed in the probate court of Knox county by H. R. Stoffer, trustee of Joseph Stoffer, showing that all funds have been distributed. The trustee asks to be discharged.

Report Filed

A report of distribution in kind has been filed in the probate court of Knox county by P. L. Wilkins, administrator of Mattie E. Updike. The report shows stock distributed to the amount of \$715.

Appointment Made

Joseph S. Durbin has been appointed.

Davy Jones, who finished the twirling for the home team was more steady and the team tightened up behind him, according to him much better support than they had his predecessor.

It seemed from the start that both teams lacked the necessary "pep" to put on a real ball game and the errors were nearly as numerous as the hits and runs. The visitors were forced to use three pitchers. For Columbus, the center fielder of that team, turned in two fancy catches of high flies after hard runs. Beeman for the locals made some pretty plays and ended the game by scoring two runs on his second two bagger of the game after two men were out.

The visitors were hard losers and claimed that Mt. Vernon teams were always favored on close decisions, of which there were several in Saturday's game, but when challenged by Manager Hall for a game on their own grounds with any umpire they wished, they were unable to say whether they wanted to try it or not.

SMALL CROWD IS AT BALL GROUND TO SEE CONTEST

An Overcast Sky And A Rain Shower Combine To Make A Record

CUBAN INNS ARE BEATEN BY A 10-2 COMBINATION

Play Is Started Late Sunday Afternoon And Goes Seven And One-Half Innings

A record small crowd was out at the ball yard Sunday afternoon. An overcast sky and a light shower that began to fall just about the time the crowd should be starting its hejira to the park were instrumental in forcing the attendance figures down to the minimum.

The Cuban Inns, a Columbus team, had been secured to furnish the opposition. Because of the condition of the infield following the shower it was impossible to start the play for almost an hour after the usual time. It was possible to play only seven and one-half innings within the time limit left.

For two innings it was a game worth seeing. Both slabs were effective in spite of the adverse conditions. Blubaugh struck out six batters and allowed one single. While less effective in creating atmospheric disturbance Beck allowed not a single safety.

The blow off came in the third frame. Mt. Vernon accumulated a total of eight runs in what session the combined effect of five safe tips and two errors. This was enough to take the starch out of anything and that is the precise effect it had on the remainder of the game. The home bunch scored twice in the fifth while ten Cubans goe their two in the fifth and sixth.

As the infield dried out playing conditions improved somewhat but throughout the play the fielders and base runners found their footing precarious. The defenders of the inner works, particularly, had a difficult time of it. They never could tell for sure, when they started for a ball they were going to connect. Or if they did they couldn't be sure it was going where they intended to put it or if they did there would be anyone there to receive it.

HOUSES MUST HAVE MAIL RECEPTACLES

Copy Of Post Office Department Order Received By Postmaster Harper

The Post office department has issued an order requiring that at all dwellings where mail is delivered door-slots or receptacles shall be provided within four months.

The order, which was received by Postmaster Harper Monday, reads as follows:

"On account of the delays caused to carriers at dwelling houses where no door-slot or mail receptacle is provided, and the fact that a large majority of dwellings are thus equipped already, it seems timely, within a reasonable period, to require all who are to receive mail by street carriers at their dwellings to provide such accommodations, the expense of the same being small. Postmasters are therefore thus instructed. The length of notice should not exceed four months, although there may be exceptional cases where postmasters should use reasonable discretion or ask for instructions.

"It is not the Department's desire, of course, that any shall be deprived of delivery by this requirement, but rather it is earnestly hoped that all will see the reasonableness of it and its advantage to themselves as well as to the carriers. But if it finally becomes necessary mail delivery will be discontinued where no door-slots (preferably) or mail receptacles, are provided."
