## THE DEMOCRATS WON

Carried the Arkansas Election by a Large Majority.

### BIG GAIN OVER LAST ELECTION.

For Governor Dan W. Jones is Elected by a Majority of Something Like 50,000—The Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee Charges Fraud in the Election.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 8.—General Dan W. Jones of Little Rock was yesterday elected governor of Arkansas and the entire Democratic state ticket has been successful at the polls.

There were but two full tickets in the field, the Democratic and Republican, the Populists contenting themselves with a candidate for governor. General Jones and Mr. Hammel, the Republican candidate, made an active canvass of the state, but Files, the Populist nominee, made no speeches.

The ticket elected is as follows: Governor—Dan W. Jones. Secretary of state—Alexander C. Hall.

Attorney general—E. B. Kinworthy. Auditor—Clay Sloan. Treasurer—Ransom Gulley. Land commissioner—J. F. Ritchie. Superintendent of education—Junius Jordan. Commissioner of agriculture—W. G. Vinoheller.

Chief Justice—H. G. Bunn; associate justice, S. P. Hughes.

The weather throughout Arkansas was cool and pleasant and, from dispatches received here, the indications are that a large vote was polled. It is believed that the majority of Dan W. Jones, Democratic nominee for governor, will not be less than 50,000, and it may possibly reach 60,000. A gain of from 30,000 to 35,000 votes over the election two years ago.

In Faulkner, Lafayette and other Populist and Republican strongholds the Democratic county tickets were elected by safe majorities. There was much scratching in Fulton county, and the probability is that the independent candidate for state senator in that district has carried the county against Hon. Jerry South, the regular Democratic nominee.

The city of Helena gives the Democratic ticket a large majority, although Remell ran far ahead of the Republican ticket. In Lafayette county every Democrat is elected. The Democratic majority in Franklin is from 700 to 800.

The estimated Democratic majority in Miller county is 800, although one office is in doubt. Woodruff is considered safe for the Democratic ticket. Many negroes scratched their ticket and voted for Jones for governor. Johnson county gives a large majority for the Democratic ticket. Jackson elects the entire Democratic local ticket and the county votes favorably on license. In Lonoke the Democratic ticket wins easily. In White county the local ticket is in doubt, but the county is claimed for Jones by about 300 majority. Sharp county elects the local Democratic ticket by 1700 majority.

### Republican Charge Fraud.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 8.—Colonel Henry M. Cooper, chairman of the Republican state central committee, prepared a statement for several metropolitan papers at midnight last night in which he states that in more than 50 counties the Republicans had no representative at the polling places, this privilege having been denied by the various county election boards. He cites Phillips and Woodruff counties, where the commissioners delegated their powers to the Democratic county judge and sheriff, they taking the stump for the Democratic state ticket. He called Governor Clarke's attention to this violation of the law, but the governor, while admitting it was wrong, said he could not alter it, as his authority ceased when he made the appointments of the county election commissioners.

### Armstrong Estimates the Majority.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 8.—Carroll Armstrong, chairman of the Democratic State Central committee, says the present indications are that 165,000 votes were cast at yesterday's election. The combined vote of the opposition reached 50,000, giving a majority of 65,000 for the Democratic state ticket. This, he says, is double the majority the Democrats received at the elections two and four years ago.

### Post Play Suspected.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—Charles Kerry, aged 17, colored, was found dead at midnight on the floor of his room with a bullet hole in his head. Richard Alcarado, a Spaniard, of the same age, who roomed with him is missing, and is thought to have done the killing. Both boys were bootblack. Jealousy is said to have been the cause of the murder. Kerry's home is in Cincinnati.

### Mrs. Fox Missing.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., Sept. 8.—Mrs. G. W. Fox, aged 21 years, the wife of a machinist, is missing, and the police have been unable to find any trace of her. She disappeared Saturday afternoon. She was much attached to her family and foul play is suspected.

## REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

C. M. Ferguson Selected as Temporary Chairman of the Meeting.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 8.—For the last 24 hours delegates to the state Republican convention have poured into the city on every train, and around the hotels things are lively. There are also here many visitors and some of the leaders of the other political parties.

Among leading Populists here are Jerome Kearby, Harry Tracy Jack Farley, Marion Williams and E. O. Call. It is given out that still others of this persuasion will arrive later on.

The state executive committee held a meeting yesterday afternoon. Chairman Grant presided. There was considerable discussion about the temporary chairman and list of delegates.

Many speeches were made. Finally C. M. Ferguson of Paris was selected as temporary chairman and Lint Weiler of Montague and D. B. Kolp of Iowa Park was selected for temporary secretary, and recommendations for sergeant-at-arms was left to Chairman Grant.

### TENNESSEE LEGISLATURE.

It is in Extra Session to Make Provision For a Deficiency.

NASHVILLE, Sept. 8.—Both houses of the legislature met yesterday in extra session. The message of Governor Turley sets out at length the financial condition of the state; says there are reasons to believe that there will be a large deficit Jan. 1, 1897, and recommends the restoration of tax rates of the act of 1895, which were reduced 50 per cent in 1895. The legislature in 1895 lowered the tax rates, but assessments so decreased this year that the revenues have alarmingly decreased. A legislative committee will be appointed to examine the estimates furnished by Governor Turley and report for the action of the legislature.

### FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT.

Two Salvation Army Officers Arrested at Dallas on the Charge.

DALLAS, Sept. 8.—Two Salvation Army officers were arrested here yesterday for disturbing the criminal court while in session. The members of the Army held a meeting on the street near the courthouse. The lawyer making the argument in the case on trial complained that the noise would not allow the jury to hear his argument. Judge Clint sent a deputy sheriff to ask them to move further away or make less disturbance. They paid no attention to the order and Judge Clint ordered their arrest for contempt of court. Judge Clint postponed action in their case until further investigation.

### KILLED BY THE COACHMAN.

A Guest of Judge Wandell Shot Down by William Moran.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—William Moran, coachman for Judge Wandell at his summer home in Saddle Rock, N. J., shot and killed Mr. Dowling of New York, a guest of the Wandells, and then committed suicide. It is said Mr. Dowling was the favored suitor of one of Judge Wandell's family. The coachman, who had long been in the family, and who was not treated like the other servants, is said to have gone mad with love of the same young woman.

### How Alabama Will Go.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8.—Governor W. C. Oates of Alabama, who has been visiting here, said today: "Alabama will give her electoral vote to Bryan. Gold Democrats and Republicans, however, may fuse on congressmen and give the regular Democratic ticket a hard fight. The cotton states will all go for Bryan. The border states are doubtful, Kentucky in particular, where Palmer and his ticket will pull a great many votes from the regular Bryan ticket and give the Republicans a great chance to win the state."

### Philadelphia Firm Goes Under.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 8.—The Lockwood Manufacturing company, manufacturers of patent feeding boxes made an assignment to James S. Freeland, secretary. No statement of assets and liabilities can be obtained, but the figures are large. The company has \$100,000 capital and has been doing business for 40 years. The plant is finely equipped with valuable machinery. The company has done a large business, but late collections have been dull and business has fallen off.

### Farmer Ambushed and Killed.

COLMESNEIL, Tex., Sept. 8.—Sam Abbit and the mule he was riding were shot and killed from ambush 18 miles southeast of here, and within a mile of Abbit's home Sunday afternoon. An inquest was held, the verdict being "death by unknown parties." Abbit was a farmer about 40 years old.

### Stabbed Fatally.

AKRON, I. T., Sept. 8.—Pat Madden of the Minn Bell Construction company, which has been building the Denison and Northern road from Dougherty east, was stabbed and probably fatally wounded at Dougherty, I. T. The trouble grew out of a settlement.

### Hurt in a Runaway.

FARMERSVILLE, Tex., Sept. 8.—While driving with his family near the suburbs here, C. F. Foraker was thrown from the buggy and hurt. Some boys had tied a can to a cow's tail and the team became frightened. It is feared Mr. Foraker is hurt internally.

## TO NOTIFY BRYAN.

The National Silver Party Will Inform Him at Lincoln Today.

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 8.—Hon. W. J. Bryan will arrive here today and be formally notified by the National Silver party of his presidential nomination. An effort is being made to have the affair carried out on an elaborate scale. The local committees have been busily engaged for several days perfecting arrangements, and the general plan of the ceremony is now outlined and the work of fitting in the details is rapidly going forward. The formal notification will probably take place on the north front of the statehouse. A platform to accommodate the candidate, the notification committee of 90, and other distinguished visitors has been erected. The paved space on the north of the statehouse will permit thousands to see and hear the ceremonies and speeches on the platform.

The committee decorated the north entrance of the statehouse in an appropriate manner. The committee also arranged so that a number of the silver party speakers from all over the west visited Lincoln on the occasion and delivered addresses at meetings which were held at several points in the city last night and at such times today as will not interfere with the notification. Senator Teller, Congressman Towne and Ignatius Donnelly are booked on the program for speeches at some of the meetings today.

### AN EARLY SPEECH.

Bryan Talks at 6:30 in the Morning at Prairie Junction.

OMAHA, Sept. 8.—Mr. Bryan began his speechmaking this morning at 6:45 at Prairie Junction, Ia. He had retired late, but at nearly every station through which the train passed crowds had gathered and the nominee was roared from his bed many times to shake hands with the Iowans. At Pacific Junction 200 of the residents had gone to the depot before breakfast to see and hear the "Silver Knight of the Platte." A baggage truck was placed beside the car and Bryan said in part: "When I started east I knew our people out here were all right, but I did not know how they would be down there. I found, however, that they were about as much stirred up as you are. All over this country those who toil and are engaged in product and industries are interested in having enough money to do business with, and those who have money instead of property and want to make dollars rise in value are opposed to it. We have a majority of the people on our side."

The first crowd to greet the nominee in his own state was at Plattsmouth, where 500 Nebraskans greeted him with hearty cheers and tooting horns. He spoke briefly and was loudly cheered.

### Hogg Speaks at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 8.—Ex-Governor Hogg of Texas addressed 5000 Democrats at Uhrig's cave last evening. His remarks were for the most part confined to the money question, the free and unlimited coinage of silver. The governor closed by predicting that New York would give Bryan and Sewall a large majority, and Bryan's election was assured.

### Republican Editors at Canton.

CANTON, O., Sept. 8.—The Republican Editorial association assembled in Eika' hall this morning. The editors called on Major McKinley at 3:30 p. m. The feature of the afternoon session was an address by Hon. Charles Emory Smith, editor of the Philadelphia Press, and ex-minister to Russia.

### A Novel Wager.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 8.—There is an election bet standing here which for originality lays over anything which has been made thus far. Fred W. Burke and Albert W. Donaldson are the parties to the wager.

The former agrees to leave this country forever on or before Jan. 1, 1896, if William McKinley is elected president, and the latter will do the country a like service if W. J. Bryan is elected. They drew up a contract to this effect, which they had formally attested by a notary.

### His Horse Not Placed.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—At the Dunstable September meeting today Enoch Wigham's American horse, Damsell II, was among 11 starters in the race for the Fitzwilliam stakes, but was unplaced. The winner to be sold at auction for 1000 sovereigns was J. Bigg's Ch. M. Chinchin.

### Lost His Right Forearm.

DENISON, Tex., Sept. 8.—Ed Beard, working in the Georgetown gin, three miles north of Pottsboro, lost his right forearm in the gin while feeding it. The gin saws caught the arm and lacerated it fearfully, necessitating amputation above the wrist.

### Joseph Crowe Dead.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—Sir Joseph Archer Crowe is dead. He was born in 1840 and was formerly consul general at Leipzig and Düsseldorf and commercial attaché at Berlin and Vienna.

### Failure at Hot Springs.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Sept. 8.—The William J. Little Dry Goods company was placed in the hands of W. J. Sumpter as receiver under the insolvency law. The liabilities are about \$40,000.
