PROPOSED BIBLE CONVENTION.

A Circular prepared by direction of the Charleston Bible Society, May 1837.
Sir—The Managers of the Charleston Bible Society, have appointed the undersigned, a committee to prepare and send forth a Circular, inviting the several Bible Societies in the State to unite with them by their delegates, in a Convention, to be held at Columbia, on Tuesday the 8th December 1837.

The objects to be secured by such a Convention, are to ascertain what has been done in this State for the last four or five years in giving circulation to the Bible; what facts may be collected, which will throw light upon our yet remaining destitutions; whether it is expedient, on any simultaneous view of resupplying the States, with the Word of Life upon a plan similar to that which was agreed upon in Columbia, several years ago; and if so, by what means and by what agencies the plan can be most fully and thoroughly, and judiciously carried into effect, so that our entire reading population, have free access to copies of the Holy Scriptures in their own possession. And finally to deliberate upon any other subject connected with the diffusion of the Bible, whether at home or abroad, in Christian or in heathen lands.

The general fact is known, that districts of country, which have been thoroughly supplied one year have contained many destitute families the next; and what is true of one district in ten of all the rest, as the same causes operate to create the want, viz: the formation of new families, the immigration of others, and the wearing out of the Bible themselves. In most cases where a supply has been undertaken, after an interval of four or five years, the destitution has been found full half as great as at the period of the original supply, and in some cases greater, from the causes already assigned. We allude to this fact because it was one of the principal motives which induced the Managers of the Charleston Bible Society to propose a convention. The Committee regard it as superfluous to urge the subject upon your consideration by any further remarks, as all the reasons for a Convention, which we could submit, must be familiar to your mind. All that we have so solicited, is that you would call the attention of your society to the proposition, that should they deem it expedient, delegates may be appointed to represent your Society in the Convention.

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Sir, there are laws against burning woods, which every good citizen enforces—it is the solemn duty of a planner to do so—to urge it upon the solicitors of this State. It is a species of assassination, when we look at the circumstances attending the man who does it, knows its baseness, because he does it in the dark, some secret place, and conceals it. He will never tell that he did it, or it be traced to his own law; then he will say, "the fire got away was an accident, or that some day person, to injury him, did it." Such barbarism, such callousness to the feelings of his neighbor, should be tried by the slap of the law—aye, by the sword!

It is not generally known, Sir, the absence of vegetable matter in the cause of rust, and this disease may be avoided by plowing &c. partially or totally decomposed, is and has been proved—because worn out fields are always liable to build prairies of the West, after the years' culture, rust the cotton, from exhaustion of vegetable mould. This of itself shows how valuable all vegetable matter is. Even rotten wood, trampled the stables and cow pens, and combined with animal manure, benefits either cotton. I would then respectfully suggest that instead of burning our new growth, we should cart all the vegetable matter to, or even pile it in the field to decay, from these piles supply our stables and cow pens. By this method we would gain the time of one raking, and husband our leaves.

Spiced Tomatoes.—As this is the season for securing a supply of this healthful vegetable, we commend to all housekeepers to put up some after the following recipe.—By so doing they may preserve them perfectly good until tomatoes come again.

Recipe for bushel of Tomatoes.—Take your tomatoes and pour boiling water over them, skin them, then boil them well, after which add a tea cup full of salt, a tablespoonful of black pepper, one table spoonful of cayenne, an ounce of cloves, an ounce of mace, mix well, and put the tomatoes in jars, run mutton suit over them and tie them up, either with strong blue paper or buckskin.—Prepared in this way they will keep a year.

[We had Tomatoes preserved in this manner, during the whole of last winter.—The quantity of cloves necessary in the recipe, is greater than is required. Half an ounce is sufficient.]—Albany Era. Jour.

LUCIFER MATCHES.—Few persons are aware of the danger they incur by keeping Lucifer Matches, unless properly protected by being enclosed in an incombustible box, or vessel. A circumstance strongly illustrative of the hazardous nature of those articles occurred a short time since in a ware room in Baltimore street. A few dozen were put up in the usual manner, and deposited on a shelf in the vicinity of other goods, and a few days only had elapsed, when the peculiar odour emitted by the match when burning, attracted attention. On examination, a box of them was found to be ignited, and the only means of safety was to get the whole lot out of the premises. No apparent cause existed for the combustion, and had it occurred a few hours later, when the rooms would have been closed for the night, the probability is that the whole interior of the store would have been in flames ere discovered.

It has not been many months since a large hardware establishment in this city was endangered by the falling of a box, containing a few gross of these matches, from the second to the first floor of the house. The effects of the fall ignited the contents of the box, which had dropped among them some straw used for packing; and although prompt exertions were used by the spectators, it was with difficulty that the burning mass could be thrown from the store, and the straw prevented from being consumed.

The extensive use now made of Lucifer and other friction matches, renders great care necessary—and the best protection against the chances of their being accidentally ignited, is to keep them in close tin boxes, or other vessels which will prevent the combustion from extending. With such precaution many accidents, and the probable loss of thousands, may be avoided. Balt. Patriot.

It has been alleged that Mr. Calloun, in 1834, proposed the "Sub-Treasury System" was recommended by the President. We find in an exchange paper, an extract from a speech delivered by him at the Session of Congress of that year, which, we suppose, contains the alleged proposal. It is as follows:

"So long as the question is one between a Bank of the United States incorporated by Congress, and that system of banks which has been created by the will of the Executive, it is an insult to the understanding to discourse on the pernicious tendency and constitutionality of the Bank of the United States. To bring up that question fairly and legitimately, you must go one step further—you must divorce the government and the banking system. You must refuse all connection with banks. You must neither receive or pay away bank notes; you must go back to the old system of the strong box, and of gold and silver. If you have a right to receive bank notes at all—to treat them as money by receiving them in your dues, or paying them away to creditors, you
