tons, worth at the average price \$28,967,220, as compared to 210,424 tons in 1908 and 249,960 tons in 1907. The production of spelter from both domestic and foreign ores, apportioned according to the state in which smelted, was approximately as follows: Illinois, 76,446 tons in 1909, as compared to 50,244 tons in 1908; Kansas, 104,007 tons in 1909 and 99,298 in 1908; Missouri, 8479 tons in 1909 and 10,201 in 1908; Oklahoma, 28,821 tons in 1909 and 14,854 tons in 1908; eastern, western and southern states, 50,422 tons in 1909 and 25,817 tons in 1908.

Tungsten in 1909. The production in the United States in 1909 of tungsten concentrates reckoned at 60 percent tungstic trioxide was 1955 short tons, valued at \$746,130, according to figures compiled by F. L. Hess, of the Geological Survey.

In 1908 the total production was 671 short tons, valued at \$229,555, and there was therefore an increase in 1909 of 1287 tons in output and of \$516,575 in value, or about 200 percent. The average price per unit for the whole amount produced in the United States in 1909 was \$6.50. In the early part of 1907 the price was \$14, but it dropped to \$9 and later to \$5, and was still lower for most of 1908.

Production of Quicksilver. Statistics collected by H. D. McCaskey, of the Geological Survey, from the producers show that the total production of quicksilver in the United States in 1909 was 29,425 flasks of 75 pound each, valued at the average New York price in 1909—\$46.17 per flask—at \$943,022. These figures represent exactly the production for the first 11 months of 1909 plus the estimated production for December. A comparison of these figures with those given by the Survey for 1908—19,752 flasks, valued at \$824,146—shows an increase for 1909 of only 673 flasks, but an increase in value of \$118,876.

Prices have steadily risen during the last three years. In 1909 the prices rose to \$46.17, \$45.23, and \$42.33. Production by States. The production by states shows a decrease in California from 16,984 flasks in 1908 to 15,700 flasks in 1909; an increase in Texas from 2822 flasks in 1908 to 3295 flasks in 1909; and an increase in combined output from Nevada and Oregon from 346 flasks in 1908 to 800 flasks in 1909.

HOPEFUL MINE TO RESUME WORK

Free Milling Gold Ore Is Yielding Large Quantities.

It is reported on good authority that the Hopeful mine of Lincoln county, N. M., will resume operations March 1.

This mine was worked for years as the property of the Eagle Mining and Development company, and was sold under attachment last fall.

At present it is the property of a new company, the Parsons Mining company, composed in part of men who were interested in the old company.

The Hopeful mine lies about 20 miles east of Carrizozo, on the east of Nogal, and at the head of Nogal canyon, in which a large amount of work has been done during the past few years.

A 200-ton cyanide mill was completed about a year ago, but for some reason did not prove successful. Half a dozen six-foot Huntington mills handle the ore, which was run over amalgam plates until the cyanide mill was installed.

The ore is in immense deposits of oxidized and decomposed porphyry, carrying all its value in fine free gold. Below the level at which the open cut starts in, the mineral is sulphide, and it may be the reason for the cyanide mill. The main working is an open cut, 115 feet wide, showing a face of ore 85 feet wide, all in milling ore.

The ore shows 500 feet wide on both sides of the great cut, and is plainly traceable a half a mile up the hill, getting richer as work progresses into the hill. It is in fact an immense quarrying proposition, and is comparable to the great Homestake gold mine of South Dakota, and the Treadwell mine of Douglas Island, Alaska, in its capacity to yield immense tonnage of low grade free milling gold ore.

MEXICO SILVER CAMP IS ACTIVE

El Pasoans and Mexican Central Men Interested in Property.

The rich silver camp of Las Minas mountains, near Ojo Caliente, a station on the Mexican Central railroad about 90 miles south of El Paso, is becoming quite lively of late.

About six miles east of Ojo Caliente, and on the east side of the Las Minas mountains, is the Adelia mine, owned by J. L. Vaughan, agent of the Mexican Central at Moctezuma station and his son, George L. Vaughan, of El Paso.

This property shows fissure veins carrying high grade galena in some places and oxide of lead in others, with silver worth \$40 a ton. Some of the veins carried considerable fine ore at the surface and at a depth of ten feet developed into a pay streak 10 to 15 inches wide.

The Adelia faces the mines of San Isidro and the Lamentos mines just across the valley.

The Inauguration mine is three miles southeast of Ojo Caliente station in the same range of mountains. It was discovered last March and taken over by employees of the Mexican Central railroad, who organized a company, of which G. W. Vanderveer is general manager, G. L. Williams, secretary and treasurer, G. L. Vaughan superintendent.

The other owners are M. D. Murphy, train dispatcher, Houston, and J. L. Vaughan.

The property contains five pertenencias and is in the foothills below the Braxton mine. During the past six months considerable development work has been done. Silver ore is found in places. One shaft sunk five meters deep shows a pay streak at the bottom three feet wide running \$8 a ton.

Another vein, a tunnel 50 feet long, shows in the face two and a half of ore running \$9 a ton. Gold is found in all the assays.

Production. Statements made to the geological survey by operators and others concerned with the coal-mining industry indicate that the production of coal in the United States in 1909, while exceeding that of 1908, did not reach the high-water mark attained in 1907, the banner year of industrial activity in this country.

Decline in Price. That the production of 1908 was more than the market could reasonably stand was shown by the decline in price in the eastern and middle fields. The price for Pennsylvania crude oil, which had been \$1.78 per barrel, began to decline on May 2, 1909, and had fallen to \$1.43 per barrel by Dec. 1. A cut was made in Lima oil from \$1.04 per barrel to 84c per barrel; in Illinois oil from 68c per barrel to 60c per barrel; and in the Oklahoma fields the price likewise declined from 41c per barrel to 35c per barrel.

Pig Iron and Iron Ore. There was a wonderful revival in the iron industry in the United States in 1909, so that the production of both iron ore and pig iron will nearly reach that of 1907, the year of maximum output up to the present time.

Estimates made by E. C. Harder, of the geological survey, indicate an increase in 1908 of more than 5,000,000 tons of pig iron and more than 15,000,000 tons of iron ore.

COL. STEVENS WANTS TO BE RETIRED

Former Chief Quartermaster of Department of Texas, a Native of the State, to Leave the Army.

Lieut. Col. Robert R. Stevens, of the quartermaster's department, of the United States army, now stationed at San Francisco as chief quartermaster of the department of California, has asked to be retired after 30 years' service.

Col. Stevens was for four years—until about two years ago—chief quartermaster of the department of Texas, stationed at San Antonio, and often visited El Paso on official business.

The Spanish-American war he was a captain and post quartermaster at Fort Sam Houston. When the war came on he was commissioned to buy the horses and mules for Roosevelt's Rough Riders which outfit at San Antonio, and later he was sent to the Philippines, where he was promoted to a majority.

Returning from the orient, he was again promoted to a lieutenant colonel and assigned as chief quartermaster of the department of Texas, which was most gratifying to him, as he is a native of Texas and was appointed to the military academy from this state.
