CEMENT RATE HEARING IS REGARDED IMPORTANT
Will Come Before Railroad Commission This Month—Galveston's Rates Help State.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 5.—The several matters docketed for hearing by the railroad commission in January will be tried, as the lumber and cotton hearings will not be considered until February. In the meantime the application of the cement manufacturers of Texas for a general reduction in the rates in this state applying on that commodity. They think the time rates are a proper basis.

At this time the Galveston chamber of commerce is endeavoring to effect a still greater saving to the producers and consumers of Texas by prosecuting its suit in the Travis county district court to have the burdensome differences cancelled and set aside. It applies on cement, cotton and all inbound and inbound shipments.

MINING NEWS.

ZINC PRODUCTION HAS GREATLY INCREASED
Zinc is a coming metal, and its production is becoming more and more a matter of importance in the mining world in this country. The growth in the production and uses for zinc have been almost as sensational as copper. Although zinc has had no "electricity" yet in the last 10 years the world's production of spelter, which is the name for the refined product, 99 percent pure, has increased 60 percent, and the production of the United States has increased 100 percent.

The world's production of spelter is within a comparatively few thousand tons of the world's production of copper. The production of spelter being 722,100 tons and its consumption 694,000 tons.

BEGGARS HERE ARE MORE NUMEROUS

The Police Are Not Keeping Them Below San Antonio Street.

Mesa avenue every evening and play old tunes. The woman performs on an old fashioned portable organ, and the man plays a violin, while a daughter stands behind them watching the crowd that drops money of various denominations into the old man's hat.

Then there is another blind man, a sort of a one man band, who plays a harmonica with his mouth and thumps a guitar with his fingers. He likewise is blind and is led about by a little dog, which he holds in leash to guide his footsteps.

There are others, one legged men, one armed men and some suffering from various other ailments, who each year come to El Paso during the winter and camp on the street corners to gather in the nickels. As soon as warm weather comes they go back north to gather in the pennies, for the latter are more often given in the north than here, because they are used more.

One prominent business man recently remarked: "There are more one legged men in El Paso than you will find in an old soldier's home elsewhere, and judging from appearances, they are not native born." There is a saloon on South El Paso street, where these beggars who have

but one arm or one leg congregate each night, buy McGinties and count the money they have collected during the day. Every once in a while one of them gets so drunk that he cannot walk, and is taken into custody by the police. Invariably he promises to leave town, but seldom does during the cold weather.

TENTH OF EL PASO'S POPULATION ARRESTED DURING YEAR 1909

Records of Police Show 5922 Arrests During Year—Fines From Reservation Total \$10,360.

Startling though it may seem, one-tenth of El Paso's population was arrested by the police of this city last year. If it is not a fact that one-tenth of the citizens were taken into custody by the bluecoats for breaches of the peace and dignity of the city and state, but the number of arrests, 5922, is equal to that portion of the city's actual population at the present time.

Strange though it may seem while the largest number of arrests were made during the last month of the year, 637 being placed under arrest during that month, the smallest amount of fines was paid, only \$493 having been paid in. However, the figures for December, as shown in the following table, are only approximate as there are several fines which have not as yet been collected and two or three cases still pending.

Largest and Smallest Fines.
In August the fines collected amounted to \$926, the most of the year, and in December, \$493, the smallest amount.
