Del Rio, Tex., Jan. 7.—The day entertainment for the governors of Coahuila and Texas was brought to a close today when governor Jesus del Valle, of Coahuila, and his official family and other distinguished guests from the republic of Mexico, boarded a train for San Antonio, where they are to be guests of the International club for several days.

A most elaborate banquet was served last night at the Elks' club to the guests and some 200 attended. Judge C. K. McDowell, judge of Val Verde county, acted as toastmaster and toasts were responded to by many of the prominent Mexican visitors and others.

George Waverly Briggs represented governor Campbell, of Texas, who was called to Austin yesterday on important matters of state. The banquet was declared a distinct success, being served by an important caterer and staff.

A reception was tendered the guests this morning at the Elks' club and the auspicious social and commercial relations existing between the people of the two border states were further strengthened and cemented.

The local entertainment committee, accompanied by many others, escorted the many visitors to the train. This ended one of the most important and far reaching events that has ever taken place in Del Rio.
