GOES TO STATION AS A WITNESS; DOCKETED AND FINED

When any of Genaro Martinez's friends get into trouble again in the police court, Genaro will doubtless keep away.

Thursday evening he went there to watch the proceedings in the case of Bartolo Bibiana, arrested Wednesday at the union station on a charge of overcharging Refugio Alvarado, whom he had taken in his express wagon from the depot to the Pacific hotel on El Paso street, insuring her, according to her testimony, that he would charge her \$25, but upon their arrival compelled her to pay \$2 for hauling her and her baggage.

Martinez testified that Bibiana had forced the woman to pay, but he, and not Bibiana, had received the money. Judge Lee, after hearing this testimony, docketed Martinez and owing to the fact that he is but 14 years old, fined him only \$3, while he assessed Bibiana \$20.

PAVING THROUGH COTTON ADDITION BEGINS MONDAY

No longer will the El Paso autoists have to bump the bumps along Magoffin avenue when going for a spin down the county road. The Petrolitic Construction company has begun work on paving this street through the Cotton addition Monday, and the work will be resumed to completion as fast as possible.

Magoffin will be paved from Alameda avenue to Cotton avenue with a street of Petrolitic 30 feet wide. This will connect the present paving on Magoffin avenue with the macadam road and joy riders will have smooth sailing on their jaunts down the county road after the paving is completed.

MORE DIPHTHERIA AT COLONIA DUBLIN; NEWS OF THE COLONIES

Colonia Dublin, Mexico, Jan. 7.—Another case of diphtheria has broken out in the family of Mr. Moffet. A younger sister to the one afflicted, is now down. It is feared that Miss Etta Memmott has typhoid fever.

SOUTHWEST SHEEP MEN ELECT AT DEL RIO

Del Rio, Texas, Jan. 7.—At the annual convention of the Southwest Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' association held at the courthouse here, the following officers were re-elected for the ensuing year: Johnson Robertson, president; J. Q. Henry, secretary; James McLyment, vice president. A resolution was introduced and unanimously adopted asking the legislature to pass the wolf bounty bill, which has twice been passed by that body and vetoed by the governor.

MAN IS CAUGHT AFTER 14 YEARS

George Musgrave Is Now in Custody at Roswell—Roswell News.

Roswell, N. M., Jan. 7.—After being at liberty since October 19, 1896, following the murder of George Parker, a cattleman, George Musgrave, who was arrested at North Platte, Neb., has been brought to Roswell.

The county commissioners have granted the petition of citizens of precinct No. 2, comprising the southern portion of the city of Roswell, for a justice of the peace and constable for that precinct and have ordered the election held January 25.

Major E. A. Lehman, cadet commandant at the Military Institute, received word of the serious illness of his mother at the family home at Las Cruces, and has gone to her bedside.

DEL RIO NAMES COMMITTEE TO CONTRACT FOR RAILROAD

Del Rio, Tex., Jan. 7.—At an adjourned mass meeting held at the courthouse here to further consider the acceptance of the contract with the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad to build its line from San Angelo to Del Rio, a general executive committee, to be known as the railroad committee, was appointed.

This committee was given full and ample power to contract, act for and as fully represent the citizens of Val Verde county as they could do if present and acting for themselves. The members are: Jones Pennington, chairman; James McLyment, J. R. Hamilton, T. B. Jones, J. J. Foster, L. Rust, Joseph Rosenfield; Fred J. Meyers, secretary.

GLOBE CENSUS ENUMERATOR MAKES PLANS FOR WORK

Globe, Ariz., Jan. 7.—At a recent meeting of the board of supervisors, Roy N. Davidson, of Globe, was selected deputy assessor under county assessor Merritt.

Sometime in the near future, in order to insure an accurate count of the people of Arizona in the 13th decennial United States census, Frank Towle of this city, supervisor for the district embracing this territory, will visit each county seat and lay out the ground for his enumerators.

DEMING BANK BUYS COURTHOUSE BONDS

Work to Start Soon on \$50,000 Structure—To Have High School.

Deming, N. M., Jan. 7.—The board of commissioners of Luna county sold the \$25,000 courthouse bonds to the Deming National bank, the premium paid being \$1501.50. Several representatives from other banks and trust companies were in attendance and over 30 other bids were in the hands of the commissioners for consideration, 12 of them being higher than the home bid. As the Deming National placed no restrictions on its bid, except to have the proper order placed by the commissioners, it was the unanimous opinion of the board that the bid was the best and easiest one to accept. The bank will supply all necessary blanks, including bonds.

It is expected that actual construction on the new \$50,000 courthouse will begin before April 1.

A new high school building will be erected during the present year. It is expected the building will be ready for occupancy by September 1. The present building, which is now the finest high school building in the territory, will be used for the grades and kindergarten.

Hon. Lester A. Gillett, of the United States land office, has been examining script land here recently.

A duplicate pumping plant will soon be installed by the city water works.

The city council and board of county commissioners will hereafter join forces in solving the tramp problem. It is planned to have the city marshal make them work on the streets and to join the county in paying the expense of keeping them at the county jail. A joint meeting of the city and county authorities was held recently to make the necessary arrangements.

Mrs. W. M. Harmon, wife of W. M. Harmon, and one of the oldest residents of Alpine, died at her home in this place Thursday. She is survived by her husband and seven children, all residing in Alpine.

STATE AUDITOR PRAISES JUAREZ OFFICIALS. A pretty compliment has been paid Juarez officials, and city treasurer Flores in particular, in the report of Victoriano Martel, state auditing official, who for a number of weeks has been checking accounts in the Mexican sister city.

In his report to the state government the official says that in his experience throughout the state he has never visited a city where an annual report has been drawn up five days after Jan. 1. He also reports that all records of the city treasury department are absolutely correct.
