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

TEXAS IS GOING DRY SING OPERA HOUSE FULL OF EL PASOANS SUNDAY

Dr. Geo. R. Stuart, Prohibition Worker, Addresses Two Mass Meetings of El Pasoans.

So that their members could attend the temperance lectures in the afternoon and evening at the El Paso opera house by Rev. Geo. R. Stuart, none of the Protestant churches of the city held services Sunday evening. Every church closed to enable the members to participate in the big anti-saloon rally.

"Texas going dry, Texas going dry. Pass the word along boys, Texas going dry."

So they sang yesterday afternoon at the El Paso theater, every man, woman and child that packed the house, filling every seat. They said nothing about Juárez, but that Texas is going dry seemed the general opinion, as well as the words of the song.

It was a big prohibition rally, given under the auspices of the local and state Anti-Saloon league which organization produced Dr. George R. Stuart, whose voice has been heard in the anti-liquor cause from coast to coast. Dr. Stuart speaks very strongly on the liquor question. And he illustrated his remarks with stories, some funny, some sad.

Sam Jones's Side Partner.

The great Sam Jones—who, by the way, was associated with the speaker of yesterday—once said that "the his-pup-yelps," referring, of course, to something said about "him. Now, Dr. Stuart of Tennessee used no such forcible epigrams, but he told a great many stories of nature with laughs after and some human interest tales with tears all through. He told of the anti-liquor movement, its history in the United States and much of his own history as an anti-liquor agitator.

Here are some of the things he said:

What He Said.

"The greatest moral movement known to civilization is taking place in the southern states. It is a natural development.

"This is the grandest, best age of history, since the coming of Christ. The saloon business with all its devastating demerit is out of harmony with it.

"Yes, this age is too good for the damnable institution that has made more paupers, blind and cripples than any other damned institution.

The Cause of Disease.

"We have had advance in prevention of disease. Why not against the very cause of it? It is directly shown that the liquor traffic is responsible for more than one half of all disease. Eighty percent of the orphans are made by strong drink. Will not the nation that cares for the orphan destroy the orphan-maker?"

"Blindness—80 percent of it comes from drink. Doesn't the drunk see double? Insanity? Drunkenness is worse. The drunkard cannot enter the kingdom of heaven.

Saloon Men and Brotherhoods.

"This is an age of brotherhoods. Can a saloon man belong to the Masons? No, he can not. The brotherhoods are doing the work the churches should do. Let's wake up and do it.

"We need to organize; that's all. There are more good men than bad men, honest men than thieves, more sober men than drunken men. The dirty gang knows its master's voice. The saloon men in Texas have millions to spend. They have it. We must get it.

Home Without Liquor.

"I was raised in a drinking man's home. I know. There is no place like home without liquor."

The speaker was introduced by attorney Millard Patterson, following a song service conducted by Rev. C. W. Crooke, of Dallas, traveling through Texas with the visiting prohibitionist, Rev. R. T. Hanks performed the invocation.

In the evening at the El Paso theater, Dr. Stuart spoke on "Eight Vices," dealing with different phases of the prohibition question.

THE COMING OF CHRIST TO EARTH

Rev. Henry Easter Preaches on "Where Is He That Is Born King?"

"Preaching an Epiphany sermon from the text 'Where is He that is born King of the Jews?' Rev. Henry Easter at church of St. Clement Sunday morning, told of the Christ's coming as the turning point of human history. It was a time well nigh complete darkness, he said. 'Heaven gods had everywhere been discredited and their worship abandoned. There was no god but self, and the story of so-called civilized life in those days reads as a horrible fable, so entirely false and untrue as to have lost all its interest and its appeal. It was a time when men's thoughts and lives, and so completely had selfishness wrapped them round. Men lived for the body only and when that was worn out a suicide's grave received it.'"

"Into such a world Christ came. Not as a conquering hero, but as the child—seemingly—of a village carpenter. The whole story of his life being foretold in the Scriptures. This life was not half so astonishing as have been its results. It is one of the great wonders of the world that the gospel of a despised and crucified Jew should be received by the world for its salvation. That a new era should date from it, a new life be infused among men by it, a new standard of morality and righteousness begin with it. Surely it is the irony of fate that the bitterest enemies of Christianity are yet compelled to date their letters by the year of its founder's birth.

"The secret of all this is that the wit, needed to Christ's life, his death and resurrection, reached not a dead departed Saviour, but an ever-living, ever-present Lord—Emmanuel, God with us.

"When he walked the earth the blind received their sight, the lame walked, the lepers were cleansed and the deaf heard. So from that day to this the spiritually blind and lame, the morally leprous, and the deaf and dead, testify daily, not to the power of an example, but to the might of a presence working in and with them, helping them to be men and women, and to realize their destiny.

"The great men of earth have vanished and their influence did not long survive them, but the power of the carpenter of Galilee increases yet daily. What greater proof could we have or ask of the reality of a leader's presence?"

"A grave responsibility rests with us to show others to the Christ which we have found. Not by loud professions, not by offensive intrusion into men's private affairs, but by ways and works of godliness. By lives which preach their own sermons, by conduct so ordered in all respects that men, seeing our good works, shall be led to glorify our Father which is in heaven."

State Worker, W. N. Wiggins, Coming to Westminster Church.

"Visions for Practical Life" was the subject preached by Rev. C. R. Womeldorf at the morning service in Westminster Presbyterian church, a Christian should first see a vision of God, then of himself, then of his fellow man," he said. SABBATH OBEYANCE SUBJECT OF DR. R. T. HANKS

Says Law Is Being Disobeyed in El Paso and Officers Are Persecutors.

At the Calvary Baptist church Sunday morning, Rev. R. T. Hanks preached on Sabbath observance, giving special emphasis to obedience to law, as it is connected with that matter. He said in part:

"I speak to you today on Sabbath observance because I do not know of any department of our civic life in which there is more flagrant violation of law than in this. And you may be sure that observance of law—respect for authority—is at the base of good citizenship. If a child is not taught to obey his parents, if he is not taught respect for authority at home, he will grow up to make a member of the lawless class in the state. It is no mystery that only about five out of a 1000 of the inmates of our penitentiary were ever in a Sunday school. It is not altogether that the Sunday school inculcates moral and spiritual truths, but it is largely because the boy who goes to Sunday school usually comes out of a law-abiding home."

The Biblical injunction.

"Some one may be ready to say, to the Biblical injunction as to obedience to law: 'Oh, that's God's dealings with the ancients; we live in a very different time, and under a different dispensation.' There are two things to be said about that. One is, the Christian, living in the year 1910, in El Paso, Texas, United States of America, is under as much obligation to love God, to honor God, and to keep his commandments, as any son of Israel ever was. The other is, while we live in the Christian dispensation, we have the same God, and in our dispensation, all the moral obligations of the law are binding upon us.

"Let me say here that we have laws of Texas and laws of El Paso about observing the Lord's day—Sunday—and whether a man is a Christian or not, he is under obligation as a good citizen, as a law-abiding subject of this government, to observe the Sabbath.

It is written in the charter of our city: 'No ordinance shall be enacted inconsistent with the laws of the state of Texas.' Therefore the Sunday laws of Texas are binding upon the citizens of El Paso, and every officer of the law is sworn to execute these laws. If an officer thus makes oath, and then connives at the violation of law in any respect, he perjured himself.

One item in the Code.

"I give you here only one article of the Sunday laws of the state. Art. 159 (186) says: 'Any merchant, grocer or dealer in wares of merchandise, or trader in any business whatsoever, or the proprietor of any place of public amusement to be open for purpose of traffic or public amusement on Sunday, shall be fined not less than \$20 nor more than \$50. The term, place of public amusement, shall be construed to mean circuses, theaters, variety theaters, and such other amusements as are exhibited, and for which an admission fee is charged.'"

After Theaters.

"This makes the Sunday evening theater and the Sunday moving picture shows, for which an admission fee is charged, clearly illegal. This state law is an El Paso law. The officers of the law are just as much honor bound to enforce this law as they are any law. They are not lawmakers, but law enforcers."

"Our city is not worse than many other cities, and not so bad as some, but what the supreme court of the United States has decided in this matter is so. No permanent good and no permanent prosperity can be built upon immorality. Men of families want to rear their children in a law-abiding community, and our city will prosper in proportion as the people love justice, administer mercy, and do good.

"And history teaches that the Sabbath observing people are the prosperous, happy people. And the frown of providence is upon the Sabbath desecrator. The violent deaths which have shocked us all have come to those who would profane God's day. The professor who was drowned while duck hunting in Mexico on Sunday; the good neighbor across the street, who went out to spend Sunday shooting and was brought back a corpse from an accident from his own gun, and the boy who went out on Sunday after Christmas to hunt, surely ought to teach us to fear God, and regard his holy day."

REGULAR ARMY OFFICERS WILL INSPECT STATE GUARD.

Encampment This Year Will Be Most Rigid, Declares the Texas Adjutant General. Austin, Texas, Jan. 10.—Adj. Gen. J. O. Newton has received notice from the war department at Washington that the annual inspection of the Texas National guard by the United States army inspectors must be completed by April 20, and asking him how many inspectors will be desired for Texas. Adj. Gen. Newton answered that three will be needed.

The inspection of the National guard will be a rigid one this year, says Gen. Newton. He calls attention to the fact that by Jan. 20 the National guard is supposed to be up to the standard of the regular army in armament, equipment, training, etc., and for this reason he expects to have his troops undergo a very exacting and precise examination.
