Stranger May Have Been Murdered on Trail Near Globe, Arizona.

Globe, Ariz., Jan. 20 .- That an unknown person had either been murdered or died 15 miles south of Globe, on the old El Capitan trail, was the news brought to this city last night by J. A. Tucker, owner of a group of claims in that district.

According to the story told to the sheriff's office by Tucker, the dead man was about 40 years old. He wore a blue shirt, kakal trousers and a leather belt. His coat was found as if he had been carrying it on his left arm when he feil. He was found lying on his left side with his right arm stretched out backward. The position of his feet indicated that some struggle occurred before death. The dead man's hat was missing. 


