


Details For Making Pretty Handkerchief Sachet Bag

EL PASO SHORT ON RAINFALL

El Paso starts out the new year with a shortage of 0.30 of an inch of rain the first month. There was a fall of 0.21 of an inch in January and we were entitled to 0.51, so El Paso is short almost a third of an inch to begin with, and the dust blowing. There were only two days in January in which there was any rain, but there were four cloudy days, 14 partly cloudy and 13 absolutely clear—real El Paso days. The highest temperature in January was 77 on the first and the lowest—a quick drop and a big one—was 13 on the 14th. WORK OF DETECTIVES. According to the report of chief of detectives Jesse C.
