DR. HYDE HELD
ON HEAVY BOND

Hyde was arrested yesterday and charged with the murder of the aged philanthropist. The physician surrendered quietly, even without demanding that the warrant be read, which was issued upon the request of attorney John G. Paxton, executor of the Swope estate.

MORE RIGID INSPECTION

MAYOR DROPS RICO
FROM POLICE FORCE

Guard Summarily Dismissed Is Later Given Chance to Explain.

The mayor was not backward in informing Rico that Juan Parra, foreman of the drillers at the city quarry, had reported to him that Rico would even let the foreman work and that he also had taken tools away from the men.

It was further reported by Parra that Rico had declared: "Oh, Sweeney is going out of office and I am running this work and the office."

Rico denied having made the report, so the mayor instructed him to have Juan Parra and witnesses before him this afternoon, at which time the mayor will hear from both sides. As he dismissed Rico he remarked:
