



ARIZONA HEARD ON STATEHOOD BILL

Mark Smith Was Before the Senate Committee This Afternoon.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19.—Former delegate from Arizona Mark A. Smith this afternoon told the senate statehood committee the particulars of the Pima county debt and how it was saddled on the county by congress and said that congress should provide for its payment.

Cameron Morrison and Hubbell will close the case for Arizona Monday or Tuesday.

Delegate Andrews has secured the appointment as postmaster at Red Rock, Grant county, of Robert H. Woods, and at Pima, Pima county, of Frank A. Santistevan.

Mr. Andrews introduced bills to increase the pensions of Benjamin F. Adams, late company B, First regiment, Maine heavy artillery, to \$30; Lewis F. Sarason, late company E, Eighth Kentucky cavalry 48th Kentucky mounted infantry, to \$30. He also secured an original pension for Albert Thomas of \$17, beginning Nov. 6, 1909, and a pension for Jacinta R. de Maldonado.
