

PLANS MATURE FOR MISSIONARY MEETING

Banquet Saturday Night Will Open the Gathering in El Paso.

Plans now are definitely formulated for the Layman's Missionary conference, and already trains are bringing delegates from east and west.

The opening feature will be a banquet at the St. Regis hotel Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Only 350 seats are possible, and for this reason each church will be offered a number of tickets in accordance with the size of the congregation. There has been absolutely no difficulty, it is said, in procuring funds for the mammoth undertaking, and the church societies are turning in the necessary cash in clockwork regularity.

Two prominent speakers have been secured for the banquet, Rev. D. Clay Lilly, a missionary of the southeast, of the Presbyterian church, and Rev. C. F. Reid, a missionary from China of the Southern Methodist church.

Sunday morning the pulpits of the various churches will be occupied by the visitors. A men's mass meeting will be held in the afternoon at the Trinity Methodist church, and a women's meeting at the First Presbyterian church. The First Christian church will be employed for the Monday and Tuesday sessions.

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 24.—As much a hero as he ever was in his palmy days, Nelson left here last night for his home in Hegewisch, Ill., after remaining in the baths all day to get the soreness and swelling from his face and body.

Contrary to the customary fickleness of a hero worshipping public, Nelson continues to be the sole topic of conversation around the clubs and among sporting men. His unprecedented exhibition of nerve and gameness in the teeth of defeat has placed the battling hero on a pedestal from which no younger man can ever dislodge him.
