

EL PASO SPENDS \$251,637.82 TO RUN CITY THREE MONTHS

Water Investigation and Presidential Meeting Increased Expenses—New Traffic Ordinance Is Held Up Because of Protests—Oregon Street Owners Want Grade Changed.

During the three months \$251,637.82 was paid out by the city clerk for the conduct of the city government as shown in his quarterly report to the city council this morning.

Of this amount \$2476.70 was paid out for investigation of the water works and \$8794.95 was spent for the entertainment of presidents Taft and Diaz on Oct. 16, 1909.

The traffic ordinance which was to have been placed on its second reading this morning was held over until next Thursday in order that the police committee may investigate protests which have been entered by Evergreen.

Mayor Sweeney explained that all should be given an opportunity to explain their objections to the ordinance as three have been called to his attention so far.

One of these is the protest of liverymen regarding the carrying of lights by private vehicles, another by the same persons relates to the hitching of two or three wagons, one behind the other in delivering them to their owners or taking them to the stable after the day's work.

A protest was entered by North Oregon street property owners relative to the establishment of a 7 percent grade and they asked that it be made 8 1/2 percent instead.

City engineer F. H. Todd reported that North El Paso street is in bad condition and must be graded before paving.

The engineer reported that street commissioner Brady said he had no place to put rock being quarried at this time.

The sewer commissioner reported put in 10 1/2"; cleaned eight plugged sewers; examined 30 manholes and flush tanks.

No Raise in Salaries. Alderman Blumenthal recommended the denial of the request of the police commission to raise the salary of chief of detectives Jesse C. Stansel from \$100 to \$110 per month.

City clerk McGhee's report for the last quarter showed collections amounting to \$125,872.60 and disbursements amounting to \$251,637.82, as follows:

now and we have no money to increase salaries," he said. Alderman Robinson reported on the request of Stewart street property owners for repairs on the street and the matter was referred to street commissioner Brady to fill in the streets.

The petition of Oklahoma street property owners to change the name to Magoffin avenue was granted and referred to the city engineer.

Street Names Conflict. Alderman Hewitt reported there is a Hill street and Hills street and said there is considerable conflict.

Alderman Clayton reported that he and engineer Todd had some over the map and found several streets whose names should be changed.

I would suggest that we put into an ordinance the names of all streets we desire changed," he said. The matter was referred to the engineer.

Alderman Robinson reported that the culvert under Arizona street at Newman street is too small, but property owners have failed to put in culverts.

Land Acquired for Street. Mayor Sweeney, explaining a bill for \$5200 paid J. C. Thornton for Leon street property reported that all the property needed for opening San Antonio street to Davis street has been acquired.

Valuation. Jas. Redmond asked that a valuation on property be investigated as it had been raised from \$4600 to \$6000.

Protests Against Grade. Frank Wells Brown entered a protest to the establishment of the 7 percent grade on North Oregon street.

Alderman Robinson said that they had all asked for a 7 percent grade and now want to change their minds.

The signers to the new petition say they signed under a misconception and that such a grade would entail expense and retard the progress of hill property.

Frank Wells Brown, Lee Marr, Loomis and Fuller, J. B. McGhee, F. H. Carter, Brown said the 7 percent grade will prevent the opening of Oregon, Cliff and Hill streets on the mesa.

Mayor Sweeney said: "We had better table the petitions until we can investigate it."

A petition from property owners in Bassett addition for the improvement of streets was referred to the street and grade committee.

J. B. Bradt and the Providence hospital petitioned for a reduction in taxes which being referred to the finance committee.

Traffic Ordinance Delayed. The traffic ordinance was ordered held up for the police committee to investigate and give protestants an opportunity to have a hearing.

The mayor said: "I understand that the stable men protest against the provision for private vehicles to carry lights; one protest was relative to running two or three wagons and I think that good. I also have a protest from boys relative to the rule by which boys under 18 years of age are forbidden to drive automobiles. We must give them an opportunity to have a hearing on the protests."
