them of shirts, trousers, coats, underwear, razors, shoes, socks and other things which they had purloined and secreted.

He parted his hair in the middle, wore dress shirts, a tie, socks and other togethery which marked him as a dandy, and the cowpunchers have regarded him with suspicion and at times resentment. Since his roundup of the tramps he will no doubt be placed on speaking terms with the cowboys.
