Guadalupe Calderon and Emmett Winters, both being convicted and sentenced to serve two years each in the state penitentiary on a charge of burglary. Calderon was caught in a vacant store, next to the American National bank on San Antonio street, about three weeks ago and Winters was convicted on a charge of burglarizing the residence of Al Fraser, on Upon avenue, in February.

PERMIT ISSUED FOR STOCKYARDS

Morris and Cameron Both Building Yards in El Paso. Other Buildings.

Following the issuance of a permit to Edward Morris to construct stockyards on the continuation of West Second street at a cost of \$2500, a permit has been issued to John T. Cameron to build on five acres on the continuation of east 11th street, in Cotton addition. These latter stockyards will probably be used only for transfer purposes, but on the former site large buildings will be erected for weighing rooms, blacksmith shops and offices, and this will, in all probability, be a salesyard where many cattle will be disposed of. It is figured by some that the packers are coming to El Paso, and Fort Worth will lose some of its trade to El Paso, which is fast becoming a most important cattle shipping point. Not many months ago, the Cudahy people purchased ground in El Paso for the erection of a small plant, similar to the one owned here by Armour and Swift, but at the time there was a well founded report that this arrangement would be only temporary, and they would later build a large branch packing house to meet competition in this field.

FISHER TALKS OF NEW HOTEL

Confers With St. Louis Men Who Own Property in El Paso.

John W. Fisher returned from St. Louis today where he has been on business connected with a proposed new hotel for El Paso. "There is nothing decided yet," he said this morning. "I am in conference with persons who are interested in this field, but two of them were away and nothing definite can be decided until they return. I am not in position to say what the result of the conference will be but things look favorable at the present time." It is understood locally that Mr. Fisher has been figuring with St. Louis holders of realty in El Paso who own the property on Overland and Oregon street with a view of erecting a modern hotel on this site.

AMERICAN NATIONAL IN TEMPORARY HOME

Bank Moves Into Building Vacated by Rio Grande Bank.

The American National bank has moved. Crowded as it was in the old Oregon street location, it is now squeezed into the room which was vacated by the Rio Grande Valley Bank and Trust company. President Wingo has his office in a little two by twice space between the west wall and the front partition. When he gets into the office it is a little crowded, but J. M. Original plans to be four stories with foundation walls sufficiently heavy to carry four additional stories, the owners of the property are thinking of adding at least one more story to the building now in course of construction. The demand for office room has been so great that more than half of the business and office locations in the new building have already been taken and it is the plan of the owners to add another story.

TO BUILD BUNGALOW ON COTTON AVENUE

C. E. Waterhouse, first truck operator at the union station, will within a few days, begin the construction of a five room bungalow on property he owns at the corner of the Boulevard, Cotton avenue and Hutton street. Plans have been drawn by architect Cartwright. The estimated cost of the bungalow is \$2000.

BIDS ARE OPENED FOR W. C. A. BUILDING

Bids were opened Saturday for the new W. C. A. building to be erected on the corner of Fisher and West Missouri street. The name of the successful bidder has not yet been announced by the association secretary and will not be until the contract is signed.

MAYFIELD RESIDENCE IN SOLD FOR \$10,000

Through the W. F. Payne agency the W. D. Mayfield residence located at 1115 East Rio Valley street, has been sold to Herbert Allen Boas, who is connected with the El Paso & Southwestern railroad, for \$10,000.

Mrs. M. J. Hitchcock is having plans drawn for a \$5000 residence to be built on Prospect avenue, in Sunset Heights. Frost and Frost are preparing the plans and the bids will be received on the building as soon as the blue prints are finished.

TO BUILD COAST LINE FROM TUCSON

Construction to Be 500 Miles - Incorporation Is For \$13,500,000.

The Arizona, Mexico & Gulf of California railroad, which is proposed from Sasco to Port Lobos, has been incorporated, according to reports from Tucson. Its stated approximate length is 450 miles, but if the plans of the promoters are carried out, it will be 500 miles long and run from Tucson to Port Lobos. The line has already been incorporated for \$13,500,000. The largest individual stockholder of the system is one of the incorporators, Benjamin P. Cheney. His associates are Arthur W. Edwards, Victor L. Mason, William M. Pryce, George W. Dietz, Benjamin Goodrich and William F. Staunton. The men stated to be interested in the proposition are connected with the Development Company of America, which has taken an active part in promoting the proposition. Charles J. Lantry, of Kansas City, who with his father constructed a large part of the Mexican Central railroad, is the engineer in charge. Mr. Lantry also ran the line of the Denver & Rio Grande through the famous Grand canyon of the Arkansas river, and built the road up Pike's peak.

THREE SUITS FOR DAMAGES FILED

All Are Against the Santa Fe Railroad and Are in El Paso Court.

Three suits for damages were filed against the Santa Fe railroad company in the 24th district court this morning. W. A. Luck, who had purchased a ticket from Trinidad, Colo., to El Paso, on March 10, 1910, asked \$2000 damages because he alleges that the conductor put him off the train at Albuquerque, and would not permit him to ride any further on the ticket. J. C. Parker, employed in the local yards as a switchman, asks \$20,000 damages for injuries sustained on August 26, 1908, when he was hurt in the discharge of his duties. He alleges that the defendant company failed to use safety appliances required by the federal act and coupling pin struck him in the stomach causing permanent injury. Edward F. Suez, as administrator of the estate of the late Jesse McPherson, who died February 11, 1910, after being injured while performing his duties as a freight brakeman, asks for \$40,000 for the family of the deceased. The petition alleges that the deceased was working as a brakeman when the train on which he was riding struck three coal cars near Van Houton, N. M., and he was thrown off sustaining injuries which ultimately caused his death. The plaintiffs represented by the administration are Mrs. Bess McPherson, widow of the deceased, and her children, Sadie B. 15 years old; Beale, 9; William, 5, all residents of El Paso, N. M.

SUSTAINS BURNS WHILE ASLEEP

W. H. Ames, Railroad Man, Has Close Call at Station Baggage Room.

W. H. Ames, a former passenger conductor of the Santa Fe Railway of Mexico, sustained a number of burns and lost a greater portion of his clothes when the cot on which he was sleeping became ignited. The origin of the blaze is unknown. He was sleeping outdoors on the south side of the baggage room at the union station. The smell of burning clothes was detected by Frank Parker, night agent, who threw several buckets of water on the cot on which the old man was sleeping and awakened him. His trousers and shoes were almost burned to shreds. He states that someone must have thrown a lighted cigar or cigar stub on his cot.

McKAY MAY JOIN S. P. IN MEXICO

Mexico City Banker Confered With Officials in El Paso.

It is reported that A. H. McKay, president of the Merchants' Banking company of South America, one of the strongest banking establishments in Mexico City, will resign and that in the future he will devote his attention to the interest in Mexico of the Southern Pacific, of which he is vice president. George J. McCarty, first vice president, will in the event of Mr. McKay's resignation, succeed him in the bank. Mr. McKay was in El Paso several days last week and spent considerable time conferring with Southern Pacific officials.

TRAINMEN CANNOT CARRY VEGETABLES IN CABOSES

Southwestern freight trainmen who have been "backhanded" packages of vegetables in cabooses, for the consumption of their families at home, have been notified that the practice must end. It is stated to be a violation of the interstate commerce laws.

STOREKEEPER LOSES MONEY FROM COAT

Frank Simpson, storekeeper at the Harvey house, was relieved of \$6 last week by some unknown person who rifled his coat pocket while Mr. Simpson was outside of the office.

G. H. TO BUILD SKYSCRAPER AT SAN ANTONIO

An announcement has been made that the G. H. will build a nine story office building in San Antonio, at a cost of \$750,000.

BANKS TO FIGHT GRAFT CHARGES

Pittsburg Financial Institutions Will Not Plead Guilty. Pittsburg, Pa., March 28.—Officials of six banks under investigation by the district attorney and special grand jury, will probably fight the charges that they gave bribes to councilmen to have their places chosen as depositories of city funds. This attitude is believed to be outlined in a statement made today from the Second National bank and the Farmers' Deposit National bank. The statement of the latter institution, signed by cashier Fleming and all directors, denied paying any money to secure city deposits and declared that if any money was paid it was without the authority or consent of the directors or officers.
