TREMENDOUS SUM PAID IN DIVIDENDS BY THE MINES OF THE CONTINENT

Arizona Second in Amount Paid Out to Stockholders. Some Official Figures.

Chicago, Ill., April 4.—For 82 American mines and metallurgical works to pay dividends aggregating \$16,267,441, for the first quarter of 1910, is a continued indication that mining, as now carried on, is an industry that will stand comparison with any as an investment. A careful compilation made by the Mining World reveals the fact that these 82 companies have distributed among stockholders, since their incorporation, dividends amounting to the remarkable sum of \$58,573,301. This is a return on the \$29,576,373 capital issued of 111 per cent.

These huge profits have accrued not only to individual shareholders, but have also contributed generously to the Phelps-Dodge, American Securities, and others, which are heavily interested in operating mining companies. Nine of these corporations with an outstanding share capital of \$310,850,000 declared dividends during the first quarter of 1910 amounting to \$3,852,585, making their total since incorporation \$111,780,263, a return of approximately 37 per cent.

Private Dividends. To the totals above can be added large profits divided by numerous private and close corporations, to say nothing of the vast sums that have been earned by smaller mine owners and prospectors.

Still another source of profit, though not so great as formerly, is that of selling metals on commission. Only one company—the United—has reported as having paid dividends in 1910, the amount being \$250,000, making its total since incorporation \$10,250,000. The gold silver-lead properties, 55 in number, are in the lead with \$6,552,851 for the quarter, and \$153,870,633 since incorporation. This is equivalent to a return of 79 percent on the outstanding \$194,418,434 share capital.

Of these 55 properties 33 are located in the United States and they paid dividends during the first quarter of the present year \$4,152,618, making their total disbursements since incorporation \$117,219,019, an 88 percent return on the issued share capital of \$132,287,694. In the lead for the quarter is Goldfield Con. of Nevada, with \$1,779,549 to its credit, and \$5,689,165

since incorporation. Tonopah, another Nevada property, is second for the year with \$350,000 and \$3,300,000 since incorporation. Camp Bird, of Colorado is third for the year with \$198,500 and \$5,951,560 to date.

Mexican Dividends. Ten Mexican companies paid dividends during the first quarter of the year amounting to \$514,593 and \$19,150,228 since incorporation. Esperanza leads for the year with \$108,000 and \$10,216,750 since incorporation. Lucky Tiger is second for the year with \$107,250.

Eighteen of the 81 companies paying dividends in 1910 operate copper properties all in the United States, and these paid \$6,161,452. Since incorporation these properties have yielded profits permitting the payment of dividends totaling \$326,696,520, a return equivalent to 308 percent on the outstanding \$106,565,989 share capital. Calumet & Hecla leads for the year with a total of \$1,477,590 and \$9,044,732 since incorporation. Montana ranks third for the quarter with \$1,250,000 and to date is credited with \$11,975,000. Two Nevada properties paid \$130,000 for the quarter and \$1,330,000 since incorporation. Two Utah properties paid during the quarter \$99,562, and to date \$3,905,237.

Arizona Stands Second. In connection with the dividends paid by these 18 copper properties it is of interest to note that the three leading copper producing states contributed to the quarterly dividend payments in the following order: Michigan leads with a total of \$1,841,900 and since incorporation \$14,462,220,500. Arizona is second for the year with \$1,477,590 and \$9,044,732 since incorporation. Montana ranks third for the quarter with \$1,250,000 and to date is credited with \$11,975,000. Two Nevada properties paid \$130,000 for the quarter and \$1,330,000 since incorporation. Two Utah properties paid during the quarter \$99,562, and to date \$3,905,237.

INSTALL MACHINERY AT BENT MINE

Tularosa Copper Company Uncovers Good Ore; Continues Development.

The machinery for the 100-ton concentrating mill of the Tularosa Copper company has arrived and is being installed. The properties of this company are the latest copper porphyry mines to come to the front.

They are near Bent, 12 miles north of Tularosa, N. M., on the El Paso & Southwestern railroad. The property is well explored by drill holes and shafts. The deposits are proved to be 45 feet thick, in blanket form and within 10 to 30 feet of the surface. The general average is 2 1/2 percent copper occurring as chalcocite disseminated through the mass. There is plenty of ore running 4 percent copper.

The property consists of 307 acres of patented ground, also 15 mining claims, a farm, ranch and house, and water rights capable of developing 200 horsepower. F. P. Kern, president of Southern Iron and Equipment company of Atlanta, Georgia, controls the company, and H. Vincent Wallace is the consulting engineer.

RICH ORE IS EXPOSED IN CALIFORNIA MINE

The crosscut from the Champion shaft has intersected the ledge uncovered at the 800 level at a lower point and reveals nine feet of ore that will mill \$6 per ton in gold. This will afford the company fair profits, and the 20 shafts are in action on ore from this point. It is possible that the Home shaft will be sunk 200 feet deeper to open the new vein at greater depth. The new strike proves the persistent nature of the vein and demonstrates that it is gaining in size with further developments. Seventy-three men are on the payroll and more will be employed as rapidly as possible. By summer the company will have the mines working on a large scale, with extensive developments going forward from numerous points. The mine is in Nevada, Cal., and George C. Fitzgerald and T. A. Kelly, of El Paso, are running it for Chicago people.

FORMER EL PASOANS LOCATE NEW PROPERTY IN SONORA

Pierson brothers, familiarly known in El Paso as Tom Guy, formerly from Colorado, but now from the Sahuarita district in Sonora, are stopping in El Paso a few days to visit Ed Didway, who was one of their early plungers in Sylvania, N. M., a year ago. Pierson brothers are now en route to New York to negotiate mines in Sonora where they have recently made several new announcements, one in particular joining the Beebe mine. They report railroad work being pushed vigorously.

The White Chief properties cover five parallel veins occurring in the fracture planes of an immense diabase intrusion 300 feet wide, through a granite country, with a north and south strike.

On one vein, called the Gundalup, is a channel 35 feet deep, with levels each 100 feet. A steam hoist is on this shaft. The ore is similar in character and occurrence to that of the Palmarejo, running from \$8 to \$20 per ton, which has supplied a 15 ton mill for over 10 years. High grade ore frequently occurring in small shoots, running from \$200 to \$3000, is shipped to smelters. The ore is hauled on a narrow gauge tramway from the mine to the mill.

The Durazno. The Durazno mines, owned by the Durazno-Tetamo Mines company, are being developed and have a record of great production. The company has put in a 50 ton mill.

Of the old mines of this district, the Miltonario is the most picturesque, having been developed by the king of Spain, and it is credited with producing many millions of dollars. It is now owned by Americans. Besides these mines there are many antiquas now being taken up by new people, and this field offers great opportunities to prospectors.

TUNNELING INTO THICK MOUNTAIN

Remarkable Formation of Ore Discovered Near Mesa, Arizona.

A remarkable mine is being opened in Arizona. E. L. Griffin has a contract to drive a crosscut tunnel a distance of 300 feet in the mine of the Telurium Mining and Smelting company, north of Mesa, Ariz., of which he has already completed 26 feet.

On the opposite side of the mountain another ledge is shown, samples of which from the surface assay \$34 gold a ton. The tunnel will also cut this ledge at a depth of 200 feet.

The formation is lime and porphyry, and the entire mountain is impregnated with mineral. "From my experience as a miner," says Mr. Griffin, "I am willing to go on record that the Telurium properties are among the biggest in Arizona."

At a distance of 70 feet, a vein of sulphide ore was cut, the assays \$15 a ton in gold. This vein where opened at the surface was only four feet wide and had low values.

Drifting in this ledge, many stringers or feeders were met, until another ledge was struck, the extent of which is not yet determined, but it is now penetrated for 63 feet, and Mr. Griffin says he thinks it will prove to be over 100 feet wide.

ORE TO EL PASO. Manager E. Williams, of the Texas and Arizona Mining company, operating at Dragoon, Arizona, recently shipped a car of lead and silver ore, weighing a little over 26 tons, to the El Paso smelter. The net returns received, after freight hauling and smelter charges were deducted amounted to \$498. This property adjoins those of the Arizona and Cleveland properties.
