

## ALL EL PASO NEEDS IS A MODERN HOTEL

New York Hotel Man Says They Hear a Great Deal of El Paso.

The New York delegation to the convention at Los Angeles, on April 12 to 17, of the Hotel Men's Mutual Benefit association has come and gone, leaving in El Paso a number of newly made friends and acquaintances. The members of the delegation arrived Saturday afternoon at 5:15, and until their departure Sunday afternoon were the guests of the city and local hotel managers, who, on Saturday evening, tendered them a dinner at the Sheldon hotel and a public reception at the country club, and on Sunday morning conveyed them over El Paso and Juarez in special cars.

"All El Paso needs," said E. M. Tierney, manager of the Marlborough hotel in New York, and former president of the Hotel Men's Mutual Benefit association, "is a modern hotel, and I am informed that it is coming. We hear a great deal of El Paso in New York, and my visit to the city has not shaken my faith in her resources."

**Souvenirs for Visitors.** At the country club, where an informal dance was given in honor of the visitors, Mr. Tierney also delivered a short address, but stated it was not probable that El Paso would be honored by the meeting of the association in 1911. A bid was made for the meeting at the dinner given at the Sheldon hotel, by the distribution to the visitors of Mexican hair hats, bearing a ribbon on which was printed, "El Paso, 1911."

Other prominent New York hotel men in the party visiting El Paso were: Fred A. Reed, of the Park Avenue hotel; W. Johnson Quinn, Hotel Empire; Caud Knott, the Earlington; H. Villiquette, Woodstock, and Thomas Hill, formerly manager of the Waldorf Astoria, but lessee of the \$5,000,000 Vanderbilt, now under construction.

Among the other visitors were: William A. Reed, of the Colonial hotel, New York; F. N. Rain, of the Palantine, Newburg, N. Y.; John McGlin, of the Reiselair, Troy, N. Y.; G. C. Schutt, of the National, Washington, D. C.; and H. H. Frank, of the Gunter, San Antonio, Texas, who joined the delegates upon their visit to San Antonio.

In the party was also Charles E. Gehring, managing editor of the Hotel Review, and deputy county clerk of New York county.

### HARMLESS AILMENT CAUSES TROUBLE

#### Man Is Hurried About the City in Ambulance for Some Time.

The resemblance of tonsillitis to diphtheria, caused great excitement Saturday night, and a prolonged ambulance ride for A. F. McKelvey, a rooming house lodger.

Authorities at Hotel Dieu received a call from an El Paso street rooming house, and at once dispatched the hospital ambulance. On its arrival with McKelvey, who was suffering from some acute throat ailment, an examination disclosed suspicion of diphtheria. As there is no contagiousness at the hospital, the case was refused.

However, a nurse was dispatched to the rooming house, some medicine sent for and a physician summoned. But the lodging house proprietor refused to receive the sick man, probably fearing contagion. After much delay the police obtained permission to send the man to the county hospital.

McKelvey is much improved this morning. His case was diagnosed as acute tonsillar trouble, more painful than dangerous.

These the constables took with them and left them in the office of Justice Watson to be used as evidence.

The warrant on which these people were arrested was sworn out by deputy constable Brown before Justice E. H. Watson Saturday afternoon. All of the persons arrested were released on their personal recognizance to appear in the justice court this morning.
