SENTENCE SERMONS IN THE EL PASO PULPITS.

"The certainty of Christ with us, rather than the mere supposition that He is with us, ought to be the watchword of every person."

"Since the world will not read the bible but will read church members, it is of the utmost importance that we become living witnesses for our Lord."

"God demands all of our strength for the work of His kingdom."

"The fruits of Protestantism are shown by the advance of the nations embracing this faith, notably England, Germany, and Holland, and the deterioration of Spain and Italy (Catholic countries) which are but shadows of the power they formerly held."

"While we must never forget that the power and life of a church depends upon the high spiritual pressure that is maintained—that it is not by might and power of man but by my spirit, said the Lord—yet it is also true that there is a human element that must not be lost sight of; that the growing church must be a working church, where there exists a hearty cooperation and a wise distribution of labor; and that splendid success we have achieved as a church this year is due, we believe, to the presence of these two essential elements."

Verses 49-51—Why may we be sure if we teach the gospel of the kingdom, that some will certainly receive our message?

If we receive a follower of Jesus we receive Jesus himself, and that is counted to us as receiving God, so Jesus states here; now what follows from this, or what does it imply?

What is the reward of a prophet, and that of a righteous man, both of which we may expect to receive if we entertain the servants of God and receive their message?

Verse 42—What is the reward of a smile, a kind word, or a generous act to a child, prompted by a loving heart in which Jesus dwells?

PREACHES SERMON ON CATHOLICISM. El Paso Protestant Minister Commends Roosevelt and Fairbanks.

That Roosevelt and Fairbanks, in refusing to meet the pope under the conditions he imposed, was indicative of the broad scope the Protestant religion is assuming, and that the Roman Catholic church is broad only when forced to be by the advancing tread of the Protestant church, were the statements Sunday morning of Rev. Bryant C. Preston, a minister of the Congregational church, at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium.

His sermon on the subject of "A Progressive Protestant Church an Imperative Need," dealt with the early history of the Roman Catholic church, and the power of the pope, who, he stated in the early centuries wielded more influence than a king and often stood between the tyrants and the people. The monks and priests at that time, it was also stated, were the scholars of Europe and the monasteries were the schools for scientists.

Beginning with the 15th century, the waning of the pope's influence became apparent, Rev. Mr. Preston said, but that it was brought about by the viciousness and iniquity of the monks and priests.

The fruits of Protestantism was stated to be shown by the advance made by the nations embracing the faith, notably England, Germany and Holland, and the deterioration of Spain and Italy, which, it was announced, are but shadows of the power they formerly reflected.

Pope Plus X, Rev. Mr. Preston also said, is a worthy successor of many worthies, but not broad enough to appreciate the following: Protestantism has secured and is developing.

"The faith of Roosevelt and Fairbanks is a heritage all should prize, and should endeavor to maintain their faith," was also stated.
