

PORCH SWING

PRINCE LEO IS CRUELLY KILLED
Faithful Friend of Many an El Pasoan, Only a Dog, Is Dead.

Prince Leo, aged 10 years, a nine years' resident of El Paso, died Friday noon, and today scores of friends, grown men and little boys, mourn the loss of a companion and friend. Especially in grief is Miss Alleen Berg, who has raised Prince Leo from puppyhood. Indirectly death was caused by injuries received by an attack made on South El Paso street Friday morning. The assailant was a sturdy bull terrier, a fighting dog. The white one attacked Prince Leo, cruelly lacerating the face of the aged dog. Prince Leo turned to run, for there were no teeth in his once powerful jaws, no fangs with which to protect his dear life.

But the terrier followed his retreat and grasped his hind leg in vicious jaws. The bone snapped, and the old dog fell in an agony of pain. Limping painfully, the old dog found his way home, and a veterinary was summoned. So severe were the injuries and the suffering of the dog that the animal had to be killed. Many small boys called at the veterinary's office to ask of Leo's condition. Many firemen in the city and a few policemen did the same. Prince Leo was a frequenter of the central fire station, a great friend of the men who fight flames. For years the dog has received his spring clipping at the hands of the firemen, who considered Prince Leo a companion of rare worth.

Although few of his friends know, Prince Leo really was of royal worth. He was born October, 1900, in queen Victoria's own kennels of Scotch Collie parentage. Leo was imported to America when a puppy, and has lived in El Paso all his days.

Funeral services for Prince Leo were held Saturday afternoon. The pedigree of Prince Leo, showing his royal strain of blood, will be buried in the plain box with the body. Interment will be made at Miss Berg's ranch.

JUDGE MECHAM'S DECISION POPULAR AT LA TUNA.

Considered a Compromise Verdict in Irrigation Case—Hay Cutting in Progress—New Fields.

La Tuna, Texas, April 22.—The text of Judge Mecham's verdict regarding the Anthony-La Union cutoff, published in the Friday evening El Paso Herald, is considered here as a compromise verdict. The Anthony people get their cutoff, but are bound by order of the court to recognize the rights of the La Union ditch community and to protect them by making an additional cut now and by other means later on if necessary. All concerned have complimented Judge Mecham on his decision.

The Dairy Farm company is shipping to El Paso 20 carloads of hay from its first year's seeding. This is remarkable and shows the wisdom of careful and heavy seeding, and a pump-

ing plant as an auxiliary to the ditch supply of water.

A careful inspection of the coming first cutting of alfalfa shows that it will greatly exceed that of last year. Also that in spite of frosts there is going to be a great deal of fruit. Over 400 carloads of hay have been shipped from La Tuna besides that which was hauled to Winton and Cautitillo. This year's yield will greatly exceed that of last year. In the valley above El Paso under La Union, Chamberino, Anthony and La Mesa ditches, thousands of acres have been sown to alfalfa this year, and the same thing obtains down the valley and around Las Cruces.


