LAS CRUCES AND MESILLA VALLEY

DISTRICT COURT CLOSES AT LAS CRUCES

Sixteen Prisoners Sentenced to Penitentiary—Guadarama Case Long.

Las Cruces, N. M., May 10.—After 20 days of the Dona Ana district court, Judge Frank W. Parker adjourned the tribunal Monday until June. Many criminal cases were disposed of but the civil docket has not as yet been reached.

The trial of David and Avelino Guadarama, charged with the murder of Ignacio Pena, attracted more attention and took more time than any other case, ten days having been occupied.

The jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Avelino Guadarama, but a verdict of murder in the second degree in the case of David, whose motion for a new trial was overruled. A motion in arrest of sentence was continued to the June term. The prisoner was denied bond.

Sixteen prisoners were sentenced to the penitentiary, as follows: Jose Gill, larceny of horses, jury trial; one year in the territorial prison and a \$500 fine.

Esequiel Rodriguez, assault to kill, jury trial, guilty; motion for new trial overruled; sentenced to one year at hard labor and costs.

Fernando Flores, larceny, pleaded guilty, sentenced to one year and costs. Epifanio Romero, larceny of goats pleaded guilty; sentenced to one year in reform school and costs; sentence suspended.

A. L. Lane, burglary, jury trial, three years and costs. C. W. Currier, burglary, jury trial; three years and costs.

Diego Baldonado and Alberto Arrelano, charged jointly with assault with intent to kill; Arrelano pleaded guilty; sentenced to an indeterminate sentence of one to two years and costs. The case of Baldonado is pending.

Candelaria Aguilar and Maximo Najor, larceny; Aguilar enters plea of guilty and is sentenced to one year and costs; Candelaria Aguilar not proceeded.

Candelaria Aguilar, suspended sentence of one year in the penitentiary put into operation on account of bad behavior.

Jesus Apodaca, larceny, pleaded guilty; sentenced to from two to five years and a \$500 fine and costs.

Clemente Najor, assault to kill, pleaded guilty, three years. Seterino Morales, larceny, jury trial; sentence of three to five years and costs.

Teodoro Salcido, assault to rape, jury trial, sentenced to one year and costs. Santiago Telles, larceny of mules, pleaded guilty, sentenced to five years and \$500 fine and costs.

Francisco Ortiz, armed with a deadly weapon, pleaded guilty; sentenced to one year and costs. Maximiano Rominez, wife beating, pleaded guilty; sentenced to one year and costs.

Santos Telles, destroying hide and ears, pleaded guilty, sentenced to three months in jail. Placido Gardea, larceny, jury trial; sentenced to three months in jail and costs.

SCORES GOVERNOR ON HEALTH STAND

"I sOne Man Out of Sympathy With Thought of Day on Health Matters."

Dallas, Tex., May 10.—Over 300 were present when the 42d meeting of the State Medical association met today here. The welcoming address was followed by the address of the president, W. B. Russel of San Antonio, who scored Gov. Campbell.

Actual business was begun this afternoon when the house of delegates, governing body of the organization, met. Waco and Amarillo went the next morning.

Dr. Russel in his address, said: "Gov. Campbell saw fit to veto the tuberculosis bill on a flimsy pretext after it had been passed almost without opposition by the legislature. He made a law providing for leprosy inoperative by withholding an appropriation and seriously crippled the board of health by cutting out every dollar appropriated here, showing in his judgment that a dollar is of vastly more importance than a consideration for the lives and health of the citizens."

"He utterly disregarded the public health plank in the Democratic platform, yet would have us believe he stands for the enforcement of its demands. "By every means in his power he has forced the minimum interpretation of the legislative act to provide and care for the public health. He is one man out of sympathy with the legislative affairs of the state who has been entirely out of sympathy with the enlightened thought of the day on public health matters."

ANOTHER SENATOR IS DRAGGED IN

Piles Is Pulled Into the Ballinger-Pinchot Inquiry by Brandeis.

Washington, D. C., May 10.—As a link in the chain he is attempting to construct to connect secretary Ballinger with the Morgan-Guggenheim interest, attorney Brandeis today brought the name of senator Piles, of Washington, into the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation as an instrument by means of which those interests, he seeks to show, brought about Ballinger's appointment as commissioner of the land office.

Although the committee by a party vote sustained senator Sutherland's protest against the name of the senator being "dragged into" the investigation, Mr. Brandeis was permitted to use a newspaper account of the celebration of senator Piles's election, held in Seattle in January, 1905, at which Mr. Piles was quoted as saying, "Charles Sweeney brought about my election."

Sweeney is president of the Federal Smelting company, subsidiary to the Guggenheim syndicate and is one of the Cunningham claimants. Mr. Ballinger said he was present as mayor of Seattle, but he did not recall the remarks.

TEXAS NURSES WILL MEET IN EL PASO

For the first time the Association of Graduate Nurses of Texas will meet in El Paso in May 1911. News of the victory over invitations from Houston Dallas and Austin has been brought by Miss A. L. Dietrich, of St. Mark's hospital, the only local delegate to the convention which concluded at Galveston. Miss Dietrich was re-elected treasurer and secretary.




