

The visitor has a contract copy which he believes will show up some Shawnee, Okla., lawyers and start an interesting government investigation. According to the contract, Iron Heart says, the tribe was asked to offer 25 percent of their appropriation to cover attorney fees. However, the paper was only signed by a few of the more ignorant, the Sioux explains.

WHEAT FIELDS LINE ROAD TO LAS CRUCES

Advent of Globe Mills in El Paso Makes Growing of Cereal Profitable.

Wheat growing in the upper valley continues to attract the attention of visitors. One rancher has estimated the amount of wheat which has been sown

in the lower Mesilla valley as approximately 5000 acres.

The advent of the Globe mills in El Paso is largely responsible for the great quantity of wheat which is being grown in the upper and lower valleys, for the El Paso mills are offering every inducement to have the ranchers grow wheat to be milled here. In driving up the Las Cruces road from the smelter, the wheat may be seen growing on almost every ranch in the lower part of the fertile Mesilla valley.

PLANS FOR \$50,000 NEW CARNEGIE FLATS

Trost & Trost are drawing plans for the new flats which are to be built on the site of the Carnegie apartment house opposite the Carnegie library. The flat building will be the first fireproof building of its kind to be built in El Paso and will be of concrete and steel construction, to cost \$50,000 when completed.

PAYS \$1175 FOR MERE GRASS PLOT

In order to have a lawn adjoining her new home on Brown street, Mrs. Kate Thurmond has purchased 45 feet frontage on Brown street between California and Nevada which will be sodded and will be an addition to the property adjoining it on the north. The price paid for the 45 feet was \$1175. The sale was made by the Los Star Land company.

CONTRACTORS SURFACING ROAD FROM EL PASO TO ANTHONY

The asphalt surface for the Las Cruces road from El Paso to Anthony is now being put down by the Caples contracting crew and it is expected to have three miles of the surfacing done each week until it is completed. The crushed rock and asphalt will be put down as rapidly as the contractors can do the work. This will make the upper valley drive as popular as the one to Ysleta.

"GREAT WHITE WAY" PLANNED FOR SAN ANTONIO STREET

West San Antonio street is to have cluster electric lights, the same as Broadway in Los Angeles. City engineer Todd has the contract for designing the lights for the new street when it is opened through Sonora, and is paved.

HUDDSPETH PRAISES COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

States Senator From This District Tells People of San Antonio How It Has Helped El Paso.

Says the San Antonio Express: C. B. Huddspeth, state senator from the El Paso district, is at the Maverick hotel.

Mr. Huddspeth is a strong believer in the commission form of government as practiced at El Paso. In discussing the new method of governing cities and referring to El Paso, Mr. Huddspeth said: "Under the new form of city government El Paso has made great progress. We have eliminated ward lines, done away with peanut politics in city affairs, and we have one of the best governed cities in the state. Our police chief is one of the best in the state because that office has been taken out of politics and a good man has been selected for the office. Since the adoption of the commission form of government El Paso has 35 miles of bituminous paving, put down to stay, and not full of holes.

"I am a friend of Bryan Callaghan, but I believe that if San Antonio should adopt the commission form of government and write a good charter the people would be pleased and San Antonio would make wonderful strides. Commissioners look after the whole city, whereas under the aldermanic system all that an alderman can see is one little spot.

Mr. Huddspeth would not discuss state politics except to say that he wants to see A. B. Davidson elected lieutenant governor of the state. "I am doing everything in my power to help elect Davidson. He is the proper man for the place and should have it."
