Failed to Heed Warning and May Lose Life—Other Accidents—Ice War.

Bisbee, Ariz., May 12.—Alfred Poquette, a French Canadian miner, was caught by a cave-in at the Oliver shaft and is buried under several tons of wet earth.

James Krilly, a mule driver at the Oliver mine, whose foot became caught between a timber and an airtrap, sustained a fracture of his leg.

J. Brown, an old resident of Bisbee who conducted a boot black stand on Main street, is dead from the effects of acute alcoholism.

Jose Lassedema was found guilty of having stolen a watch and sentenced to 60 days in jail.

J. Stoval has been taken to Tombstone, where he will be examined as to his sanity.

Thrown from a horse and falling to get one foot over a stirrup, G. Williams was dragged and had his head injured.



People Will Thank Everybody Who Helped Them—Murder Trial Begins—Court Opens Soon in Deming.

Hillsboro, N. M., May 12.—The citizens of Hillsboro are arranging a meeting to present resolutions thanking the members of both house and senate for their action in regard to the county seat removal bill, and the Socorro county \$25,000 bond issue.

The jury in the Francisco Baca case is being empaneled. Considerable difficulty is being experienced and Judge Mechem has called for a special venire of 50 men and it is extremely doubtful if the testimony will be commenced before Friday.

Two life convicts, Alma Lyon and Valentine Madrid, both females, are here waiting to be called as witnesses on behalf of the territory. They are garbed in common calico dresses of the same pattern, but their hats are differently made and styled. Their former acquaintances here greet them as they pass along the thoroughfare to and from court.

On the other hand, J. E. Griffith, representing the territory, is putting up a magnificent fight for the territory of New Mexico.

CORPORATION TAX BRINGS IN BIG PUND TO UNITED STATES.

Washington, D. C., May 12.—As was expected, the second New York internal revenue collection district, comprising Manhattan, lying south of West Twenty-fourth street, will pay the largest assessment under the corporation tax, amounting to \$3,274,743.

The Illinois, Chicago district, will pay the next highest amount, the assessment being \$2,286,756, with the 23rd Pennsylvania, Pittsburg, district, third, at \$1,543,098.

San Francisco will pay three-quarters of a million and the St. Louis district \$675,656.

The Montana district sent in the largest number of returns, 13,372, but the assessments aggregate only \$204,261. New Mexico made 1185 returns; assessments, \$73,717, and the third Texas district, 2774 returns; assessments, \$214,786, and the fourth Texas district, 2673 returns; assessments, \$179,615.

MISS ANNE MORGAN TO WED JUDGE LINDSEY.

Denver, Colo., May 12.—The wide circle of women intimate in politics is buzzing with the rumor that Judge Ben R. Lindsey, the famous juvenile court judge, and Anne Morgan are engaged to be married. The circle includes the women who observed the two persons together during Miss Morgan's stay in Denver, and who whispered mysteriously about two long conferences held by the respective mothers of the judge and the heiress.

The marriage of Judge Lindsey and Miss Morgan is not an impossible or improbable event. He is 41 years of age and she is about 35.

BUILDS BIG FACTORY AT GUADALAJARA, MEX.

An investment of \$300,000, representing merely the first cost, is being made in a packing plant at Guadalajara, the second largest city in Mexico, by a California syndicate, of which the president is Thomas H. Williams of San Francisco, president of the California Jockey club. The works will be modeled after the big plants of Chicago, to which city H. H. Hinkle, the superintendent, journey to study equipment. The company has obtained a state concession granting practically a monopoly upon the local meat supply.

MEXICO CITY WILL SOON HAVE GAS FUEL

A momentous event in the economic life of Mexico City will transpire within a few days in the inauguration of service of the Mexican National Gas company, the first to offer the city, century old, that form of fuel. E. L. Doherty of Los Angeles is president of the corporation, which has erected a \$1,250,000 plant. For a starter the plant will have a daily capacity of 1,600,000 cubic feet and it will be enlarged later as the demands may require.

DR. PEARSON MAKING SODA AT MEXICO CITY

A cool \$1,000,000 has been invested in the establishment near Mexico City of a calcium carbide works by the Mexican Steel and Chemical Products company, a corporation subsidiary to the many-million-dollar Mexico organization of Dr. F. S. Pearson. Soda will be manufactured from the vast tequisquite deposits in the bed of the dried-up Lake Texcoco. The factory will also produce gas, generating material to supply acetylene lighting outfits and high-grade tool steel, by electricity. Fifteen hundred workmen will be employed. The carbide plant will have an output of 2000 tons a year and will require more than 500 horse power of electricity, to come from Dr. Pearson's power plant at Necaxa.
