FORMER SUNSET HEIGHTS OWNER SAYS LAND IS WORTH A MILLION

Disposed of El Paso Holdings and Now Owns Rich Mines in Mexico. C. H. Silliman, formerly president of the chamber of commerce of Ft. Worth, and manager of the Texas Land Mortgage bank of that city, with Mrs. Silliman and son, have been seeing the sights in El Paso and Juarez. Mr. Silliman is at present in the loan and investment business at 49 Wall street, New York, and is returning there from Los Angeles and the Imperial valley, where he has large property interests. He at one time owned the Satterthwaite addition, now called Sunset Heights in El Paso, which he sold through his local agent, H. B. Stevens, for about \$25,000.

"The growth of El Paso," said Mr. Silliman, "is marvelous. The property I held and sold so cheap is now undoubtedly worth a million dollars. The same causes that brought about this wonderful result are going to continue, and I firmly believe El Paso will in a decade have over 100,000 people."

California's Interested in Oil. "I saw in the Los Angeles papers that oil has been struck in New Mexico north of here and at Toyah, east, and there is a keen interest on the coast taken in the matter. If the reported strike is confirmed, there will be no trouble in interesting California capital in it. Los Angeles today is the greatest place for promoting and financing mining, oil and industrial enterprises in the United States."

EARLHAM RANCHERS IMPROVING PROPERTY.

Mossman Strikes Water at Shallow Level—Cold Huts Fruit—Santa Fe Completes Station Improvements.

Earlham, N. M., May 17.—Major G. W. Mossman has been irrigating his ranch and improving his place.

Walter Mossman has struck a flow of water at section 24, township 25, range 3, east, at a depth of 120 feet.

William Brown states most of his fruit was injured by the cold snap, but the frost very well. Mr. Baker has taken his haying machinery out to Mr. Brown's ranch to be ready to cut the first crop of alfalfa, which he has purchased.

The carpenter gang of the A. T. & S. F. railway have completed the improvements at the depot, section and tool house, which are ready for the painters. A new crew is expected to extend the switch to the north cattle guard on Col. Newsum's land.

Mrs. Lovella Newsum has received two pairs of homer Plymouth rock pigeons from Deming. They are of the finest strain and best individuals in the southwest.

The old Earlham ditch is within its banks and the roads are generally passable. The high water in the river has claimed quite a number of cottonwood trees in Col. Newsum's grove.

Arrangements have been completed for the opening of two groups of properties this year, said Mr. Silliman, "and negotiations are under way for similar arrangements in regard to other mines of our company. In all, the mines number 28, covering an area of about 1240 acres. The Colon-Espinoza is the most important group. The ores carry values in silver, copper and lead. The mines have been developed by shafts and tunnels, but the situation of the properties, on a steep mountain slope, peculiarly favors extraction by tunneling. Transportation has constituted one of the chief obstacles to the realization of profits, but the enormous transportation costs will soon be obviated, as E. A. Thomas, the president of the company, is beginning the installation of a large smelting plant near the mines and Choix. Work has been resumed on the railroad and soon we will ship our bullion either down to Topolobampo or east to El Paso, where there is access to the metal markets of the world."

PLANS NOT DRAWN FOR VIADUCT AT OLD FORT

When City Engineer Gets Them Completed, Roads Will Then Act.

When are the railroads to erect the viaducts across their tracks near the smelter? This question has been asked but not answered and the matter is still uncertain.

In October, 1902, Jos. L. Sweeney, who was at that time mayor of El Paso, decided that the railroads should erect viaducts at once. He summoned the representatives of the Southwestern, Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads and the manager of the El Paso Electric railway to appear before him for a conference. Then they all agreed that as soon as city engineer F. H. Todd would prepare plans and specifications, to gether with an estimated cost of the work to be done, they would do as required. Todd is still working on these plans, and has not yet reached a definite decision as he has considerable other work to do.

The work of grading Main street for the old smelter road crossing has been delayed because the city engineer has been working on plans for a continuation of the present Oregon street and Main street storm sewer out along the tracks to a point between Canova and west Rio Grande street, whence it will cut south and empty into the river.

At the point where this turn is to be made, there has been a culvert which was constructed some time ago to carry away the flood waters from the hills, but it proved too small, became clogged up last year and the water backed over the tracks, cutting out a considerable portion of the roadway of the Santa Fe. It is in order to avoid such accidents as this in the future that the larger sewer will be constructed.

Todd contends that it would be ill advised to lay a pavement at the crossing and then be compelled to tear it up to make room for the storm sewer.

Further, he is not in favor of a large crossing of 100 feet or more in width as proposed by the property owners on the ground that it would be almost impossible to operate gates there, and there might be some danger. He says that in order to have gates on north Oregon street it was necessary to enlarge them so they could be worked advantageously, but they are the limit in width.

MANY CATTLE KILLED IN A MONTH ON RAILROAD. Thirty-four head of cattle and 66 head of sheep were struck by engines on the eastern division of the Southwestern during the month of April, according to a bulletin just posted. Orders have been issued to engineers that they must be more careful in the future. Engineers have also been cautioned against running too fast into and out of terminals and through yards. No engineer may run his train faster than 10 miles an hour on arriving or leaving a terminal.

George Look has filed suit against the city of El Paso in the 41st district court to try title to part of Sonora street, the land being described as all that portion of old Sonora street lying between blocks 169 and 170, Campbell addition, all that portion of the alley in block 170, Campbell addition, extending northerly from old Sonora street, 16 feet 8 inches, and all that portion of the alley in block 169, extending 61 feet 4 inches, which said street and alley have heretofore been abandoned as streets and alleys by the city of El Paso. The plaintiff avers that the defendant

unlawfully entered thereon on May 19, 1919, ejected him therefrom and withheld him from possession thereof. He asks for restitution of the land rents, damages and costs of suit.
