RIPLEY SAYS PINS ARE SET AGAINST RAILROAD MEN
 Chicago, Ill., June 1.—"They're got the pins set against us," was the first comment of E. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe system, when informed that the government will seek to enjoin the railroads of the Western Traffic association from putting into effect an advance in rates scheduled for today.
 Mr. Ripley's subsequent remarks left no doubt that the railroads will fight the government with all their great resources.
 "The shippers who have attended meetings to protest against the advance have no personal knowledge of the subject," the Santa Fe president continued. "They have been deceived by

the ringleaders of the movement who have distorted the facts and have juggled with the figures."
S. P. FREIGHT WRECK AT ANAPRA DELAYS PASSENGER TRAINS

No. 10 left El Paso for the east at 8:45 p. m., and No. 2, at 8:40 p. m. The wrecker was sent to the scene of the derailling early Wednesday morning. Seven freight cars left the track at Anapra. The damage to the track was quickly repaired.


ABOUT RAILROAD PEOPLE.

EXPLOSION KILLS 25; WOUNDS MANY
 Ogden, Utah, June 1.—Twenty-five workmen were killed this morning in an explosion in the quarry of the Union Portland Cement works at Devil's Slide, Utah, 39 miles east of Ogden. The explosion blew down the telephone and telegraph wires and details of the catastrophe have not yet been received. Most of the dead are Japanese and Greeks who made up a quarry gang of 75 to 100 men. A special train has left Ogden, carrying physicians and nurses. More than a score were injured.

PROHIBITION QUESTION ON DEMOCRATIC BALLOT
 Appeal Will Be Made for Voters To Ask Submission of the Proposition at July Primaries.
 Dallas, Tex., June 1.—The question of prohibition will be placed on the Democratic ballot primaries on July 23 if the plans now formulating succeed. Dr. G. C. Rankin, Dr. J. B. Gambrell and T. N. Jones, the latter of Tyler, will sign an address, soon to be issued to the voters, asking them to prepare and send petitions to the state executive committee asking that the proposition be placed on the ballot.

STRIKE ORDERED ON HARRIMAN'S TEXAS LINES
 Houston, Texas, June 1.—President Lowe, of the International Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees, who last night ordered a strike of all members of the order on the Harriman lines in Texas, said today that the men are responding promptly and that practically no track work is being done. The union claims 90 percent of \$500 men involved have struck. Railroad officials say the places of the men can be filled promptly.

PITTSBURG BANKERS FINED AND SENTENCED TO JAIL
 Pittsburg, Pa., June 1.—E. H. Jennings, president of the Columbia National bank, and F. Griffin, cashier of that institution, pleaded no defense to the charges of conspiracy and bribery in connection with the recent municipal corruption exposures, and received sentences. Jennings was fined \$500 and will serve two months in the Allegheny county jail. Griffin was fined \$500 and will serve four months in jail.

GETTING UP OLD FIRE RATES FOR COMPARISON
 The chamber of commerce is arranging to compile a comparative schedule of fire insurance rates including the old rates actually in effect before the application of the new law and after the rating under the law was applied. This data will be furnished senator Claude B. Hudspeth before he leaves for Austin to represent El Paso at the meeting of the state fire rating board to be held there June 20.

EL PASOANS TO SEE FIGHT.
 The first fight tickets purchased by El Pasoans as far as known were bought by five members of the Tolltec club Tuesday. A party from the club will go to San Francisco in time for the fight and will be "among those present" when the big mill is pulled off.
