WATER RESERVOIR FOR PECOS VALLEY

25,000 Acres Will Be Under Cultivation—Balmorhea Has Growth.

Pecos, Texas, June 15.—The Swenson Land company, operating in the Toyah valley, has closed negotiations with eastern capitalists for the construction of a large reservoir which will bring 6500 acres under irrigation.

Since acquiring control of the Toyah valley property the company has had the streets graded, trees planted and a large acreage seeded to alfalfa and fruits.

Work will commence once on the construction of a number of large buildings in the town, and of over a mile of concrete sidewalks.

LAS CRUCES CROPS ARE PROMISING

Corn Laid By—Wheat Harvest in Progress—Cantaloupes Growing.

Las Cruces, N. M., June 15.—The Mesilla valley farmers are busy. Some are laying by their corn, in many localities wheat is being harvested and laid up and down the valley the second crop of alfalfa is being cut and baled.

The cantaloupe crop is the most promising, taking all fields and striking a general average, than has ever been seen here and although the acreage is considerably short of what was planted last year, it is expected that more money will come in this year from profits than was last year.

Many farmers are also planting enough sorghum, milo maize, kafir corn and other grains and forage stuffs for their own use.

HEAVY RAIN AND HAIL FALLS AT LAS CRUCES

SENATE PASSES THE RECLAMATION MEASURE

Washington, D. C., June 15.—A bill to authorize the issuance of certificates of indebtedness to the amount of \$30,000,000 to complete the reclamation projects, has been adopted by the senate as a rider on the pending administration land withdrawal bill. Only Burton, Gallinger and Keen voted against it.

STREET CAR CO INCREASES CAPITAL

Manager Says There Is No Intention of Building Into Valley.

The El Paso Electric Railway company has filed a certificate with the secretary of state to increase its capital stock from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.

This increase was authorized by the stockholders and directors of the company in order to pay certain of its floating indebtedness and to provide for future improvements and extensions to its property, according to H. S. Potter, general superintendent.

He said Wednesday morning that no other improvements are being contemplated for the line aside from those now being made in the paved district and at the car barns and the purchase of new cars. He said he had heard nothing of a proposal to extend the smelter line up the valley or to build to Ysleta, Clint and Fabens.

THE KICK OF THE MAN WHO BUYS ICE

Drug Stores and Sodawater People Get It Less Than Half Price.

Mr. Home Ice User has a kick against the local ice companies. He says that while he is forced to pay \$9 cash in advance for a coupon book containing coupons good for a ton of ice (2000 pounds), his neighbor, the soda fountain keeper, the drug store owner and saloonkeeper get the same quantity of ice for \$4 per ton.

At the El Paso Ice & Refrigerator company's office, the price for ice delivered was stated to be 50 cents per 100 pounds or 40 cents if the ice was called for. A coupon book was sold for \$9 in advance, good for 2000 pounds of ice.

The rate for soda fountains, saloons, etc., was given at \$5 per 2000 pounds, or \$2.50 for 1000 pounds.

At the Consumers' company the same rate for residences was quoted, 50 cents being charged for 100 pounds if delivered or 40 cents if called for on the platform. The hotel, saloon, drug store, and soda fountain rate was given at 25 cents per 100 or \$5 per ton, no coupon books or advance payments demanded but, instead, regular monthly bills rendered.

For rooming houses and boarding houses this company quoted a rate of 25 cents per 100 pounds where 50 pounds or over is taken at one time, to be paid either by cash or by coupons from a book paid for in advance.

The Globe Ice & Cold Storage company quoted the same rates as the other companies on 100 pound lots delivered to the residences and to soda fountains and drug stores.

ARREST SECOND ALLEGED SMUGGLER IN BELEN CASE

Charles E. Crawford Charged With Conspiracy to Enter Ten Chinamen; Continuance for Moore.

Charles E. Crawford was arrested by immigration officials Tuesday afternoon on a charge of conspiracy to bring Chinese persons into the United States at El Paso, Tex. On May 25, Ten Chinamen were taken from a box car by the immigration officials.

Victor H. Tobin has been arrested for his alleged connection with the case. The trial of both men will be held Friday morning in federal court.

The case against Elijah Moore, arrested at the union station, on the charge of smuggling opium into the United States, was called Tuesday afternoon, but was continued until next Monday.

CHINAMAN DEPORTED.

Pun Wah, a Chinaman, arrested by immigration officers on the charge of being illegally in the United States, was tried before commissioner George R. Oliver in federal court Wednesday morning and ordered deported to China.
