
PARIS FASHION HINT.

JOLLIFICATION IN LAS CRUCES FOR STATEHOOD

People May Not Like Bill in Every Particular, But Are Glad Anyhow.

Las Cruces, N. M., June 23.—The interview with Judge Albert B. Fall concerning the statehood bill, published in The El Paso Herald, on June 21, has caused considerable comment among men of affairs, political and otherwise, in Las Cruces and throughout the county.

The qualifications of all state officers and members of the state legislature, that they be able to read, write and speak English is excepted to by many, but they do not object to its inclusion so much as they do to senator Beveridge's reference to it when making a statement of the differences between the house and senate bill on which he spoke.

All are in line with Judge Fall when he thinks that "both Democrats and Republicans will insist upon at least one senator coming from the southern part of the territory." So far do they coincide with him in this that it is generally said that the territory should be treated as two senatorial districts and one prominent attorney from blue pencil line on the southern boundary of the counties of Valencia, Torrance, Guadalupe and Quay, designating the 15 counties above as the northern district and the counties below as the southern district, believing that this would be a fair division on the senatorial proposition.
