Coroner Places Blame On Thursday night Judge Amos E. Green held an inquest and the foreman of the jury was Homer Hill. The following is the verdict: "We find that Emil Katzenstein came to his death in the city of Socorro, Socorro county, N. M., on July 28, 1910, from the effects of two gunshot wounds inflicted by Frank Schmidt, alias Frank Conway, whose true name is not known, and that he was aided and abetted in the crime by one Sam Johnson."

Judge Amos E. Green, as coroner, and Homer Hill, as foreman, signed the finding. The funeral of the deceased occurred this afternoon at 2 o'clock, the ceremonies being in charge of the Odd Fellows, the Elks and the fire brigade.

His parents, brothers and other relatives were present from Las Cruces and other points. Bells were tolling all day. Deceased was an Odd Fellow, a Highlander and a Woodman.

INVESTIGATING THE BRIDGE ACCIDENT

The inquest was taken Saturday morning. It is said that according to the Mexican law, corporations are not held responsible for accidents unless the error being individually blamed. This point is not discussed by Mexican officials it merely being said that action will depend upon the disclosures of the investigation.

The committee appointed by the court is composed of Manuel M. Mandiola, chief engineer of the Juarez protective work; Juan Valdez, road superintendent, and Estanislado Zayas, engineer of the Mexican boundary commission. These experts will report to the court as to the cause of the wreck.

Police Guard Bridge. Police are guarding the Mexican side of the bridge, allowing none to pass. An army of workmen have raised the fallen car in an upright position, and "jacking" has begun. The bridge remains practically the same, although carpenters are at work.

Slow Car Service. International car service is running on an every-ounce-in-a-while schedule. Two cars are being run over the Stanton street bridge, the single track causing one to wait at the race track line cutoff. These cars run to the Mexican side of approach of the Santa Fe street bridge and then return to El Paso. Another car is being run directly to the damaged bridge and return.

SILVER CITY REPUBLICANS HOLD THEIR PRIMARIES Silver City, N. Bush, Jose Montes, Jr., and attorney Max Fowler.

Many Democratic delegates are here for the Democratic county convention today. Territorial chairman Walton is here and will take an active part in the proceedings. Some live contests will be pulled off, as a dozen or more candidates are out for the four nominations for delegates to the constitutional convention.

GOES AFTER INFORMATION FOR PRESIDENT TAFT

Beverly, Mass., July 29.—Senator Winthrop Murray Crane, of Massachusetts, who occupied in the senate a position similar to that of the Republican "whip" in the house, was summoned to Beverly today by president Taft and had a long talk with the chief magistrate.

Senator Crane was asked by the president to make a trip through the west in the near future, going as far as Seattle. He will inquire into political conditions in the states through which he travels. The president is said to desire this information first hand.

TAFT TO VISIT CANAL MAY ELIMINATE POLITICS

Beverly, Mass., July 29.—In November, it was announced, the president will make a three weeks' trip to the Isthmus of Panama to observe the progress of the work on the big ditch. Whether the cancellation of the numerous engagements for the fall mean a reversal of the president's travel policy or not could not be learned. Political consideration may have had a great deal to do with the president's decision.

In a speech at Rockland, Maine, the other day Mr. Taft said he did not believe a president of the United States had a right to talk politics.

TUCUMCARI DEMOCRATS TO HOLD PRIMARIES

Tucumcari, N. M., July 29.—The Democratic county central committee met at the courthouse with chairman W. W. Mayes presiding. A majority of the precincts of the county were represented by proxies. It was decided to hold a primary August 13. A vote to decide as to the method of nomination resulted in 17 votes for a primary and five for a convention. Speeches were made by C. C. Davidson, J. D. Cutlip, Henry Swan, C. H. Hiltson and others. The utmost harmony prevailed.

DOESN'T FEAR AN AEROPLANE IN WAR

fought in the Nicaraguan army under Estrada, is in charge of the party and sheriff Black and deputies are acting under Fowler's command. The purpose of these men is to stop the trouble, if possible, but if the negroes resist, serious trouble is likely when Fowler and party reach the scene.

A message received at Palestine says the company of state militia stationed at Marshall has been ordered to Palestine and it is expected to arrive at 7:30 tonight.

The white man killed is reported to be a deputy sheriff of Houston county. Reports of further deaths cannot be confirmed.

Palestine saloons were all closed at noon and business is practically at a standstill. Deputies this morning disarmed many irresponsible persons on the streets. Hardware stores have been prohibited selling arms and ammunition.

WOULD PREVENT MISFIT MARRYING

Los Angeles, Cal., July 28.—Professor David Starr Jordan, president of the Leland Stanford, Jr., university and one of the world's recognized authorities on biology and cognates of science, states that he believes the surest way



to improve the human race is to enact more strict marriage statutes and unify divorce laws. He said that the quickest way to advance civilization was to prevent the unfit from marrying; he believes that this is the way in which the bad influences of heredity can be eliminated. Professor Jordan is on his way to Europe to attend the congress in Berlin on liberal religion, and the other zoologists, at Graz.

NIAGARA PROTESTS

Washington, D. C., July 29.—Attorneys representing the Madrid government at Nicaragua today filed protests with the department of state, justice and commerce and labor against the sailing of the yacht Hornet, now at New Orleans, with a cargo of arms and ammunition, supposed to be intended for the use of the Estrada faction.

RIOTING STOPPED IN COLUMBUS, O.

Troops Had to Be Thrown Out as Police to be Made Effective.

Columbus, Ohio, July 29.—Everything is quiet here today following the outbreaks of last night consequent upon the resumption of the street car service. Adjutant general Weybrecht and general McMaken, who are in command of the troops, have considered the advisability of calling out the entire Ohio National guard. The first regiment of Cincinnati and the first regiment of Cleveland have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for a call.

Adjutant general Weybrecht, after a conference at midnight with mayor Marshall, during which the mayor presented a report of thirty-nine riot calls responded to by the police yesterday, announced that during today he would completely patrol the city with troops and that if the force here proved insufficient he would summon either the Fifth or Eleventh regiment.

The presence of three regiments of the national guard did not deter the rioters last night and it proved to be the worst since the strike began. A score of imported employees of the Columbus Railway and Light company were injured by stones, bricks and other missiles and by 10 o'clock car service, which had been resumed at 1:30, following the return at noon of governor Harmon to the city, was suspended and cars were taken to the barns for the night.

Mayor Marshall was disappointed in the aid lent by the troops. Promptly on his arrival governor Harmon declared that the militia could not be used for police duty. He declared they should remain in their camps unless summoned

to points where rioting broke out. The result was that when night-fall came, the union sympathizers began to stone cars in all sections of the city.

SERIOUS RIOTS AT COAL MINE WHERE STRIKE IS ON

Greensburg, Pa., July 29.—In a fight last night near the Export coal mines, ten miles from here, a striking coal miner was shot and killed and George Davis of Wilkesbarre, a member of the state constabulary, was seriously wounded. A score of others received minor injuries.

The battle was the result of efforts of officers to arrest sharpshooters, said to be strike sympathizers, who for the last week have nightly endeavored to shoot out a searchlight placed at the strike affected mine.

SUFFRAGISTS TO HAVE BIG PARADE

New York, July 29.—There are to be some unique features to the monster suffrage parade which takes place in New York city in October as the opening gun of the suffragists' fall campaign.

According to announcements just issued, one float will be filled with "suffrage babies" to show that the suffragists do not neglect the rearing of families. Another tradition will be shattered by a float which is to contain the "most beautiful American suffragist," seated in a sedan chair.

TORPEDO BOAT SAKE

Annapolis, Md., July 29.—The submarine torpedo boat Cuttlefish, which became disabled in Chesapeake bay last night and for a time caused much concern, returned safely to Annapolis this afternoon.
