LEE STATUE TO STAND AT CAPITAL

Wickersham and Taft Honor Confederate Fighter's Memory.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 1.--President Taft has approved without comment, an opinion by attorney General Wickersham to the effect that there is no provision of law by which the statue of general Robert E. Lee in Confederate uniform can be removed from Statuary hall in the capitol at Washington.

In addition to deciding the question on a purely legal basis, Mr. Wickersham argues the matter from an ethical point of view, declaring that Lee has come to be regarded as typifying all that is best in the nation's history.

Mr. Wickersham's opinion was called forth by protests to the president from the department of New York, Grand Army of the Republic.

TYPHOID FEVER IS SCARCE IN EL PASO

Only Five Cases at Present According to the Health Report.

There are only five cases of typhoid fever in the city at the present time, according to the report of the city health department. Four of these are what are known as non-typhoid cases, the victims of the disease contracted in other places. Most of these are railroad men. The health department reports that El Paso is particularly free from disease at the present time.

MAN FOUND IN RIVER DIES IN HOSPITAL

A. C. James Sixty Years of Age is the Victim of Heart Trouble.

A. C. James, an old man found unconscious in the bed of the Rio Grande river Sunday night, died Monday morning at the county hospital about 9 o'clock. The deceased was unconscious from the time of his discovery until his death. He was apparently about 60 years of age. Heart failure is given as the cause of demise.

James was found near the Stanton street bridge, by two inspectors, who heard his groaning. They located him in an unconscious condition, about 100 feet east of the bridge. An ambulance was summoned, and the sick man taken to the county hospital where he was treated by Dr. Jack Sweeney, who pronounced it a case of heart trouble.

Nothing is known of the relatives of the deceased. A card found in one of his pockets supplied his name and the fact that he was a member of the local carpenter's union.

No arrangements have as yet been made for the disposition of the body.
