ENDS HIS LIFE WITH A BULLET

Dalhart Young Man First Shaves, Bathes and Changes Clothes.

Dalhart, Texas, Aug. 11.—Mack F. Stewart, son of A. M. Stewart, a Presbyterian minister, shot himself fatally at 1 p. m. today with suicidal intent. Young Stewart was 21 years old and a law student here. Formerly he was a department store clerk in Houston, Galveston and Galveston stores and stood high as a business man.

The family came from Bonham, Texas, and the young man developed paranoia and placed himself in the care of Dr. G. W. Dawkins. For the past few days his condition was alarming and close watch was placed over him with the intention of removing him to a sanitarium Friday.

This morning he was down town settling all his bills, visited a barber shop and returned home at noon. He excused himself to his mother, bathed, put on clean underwear, went to his bed, placed a pillow under his head and placed a .32-caliber revolver, that in an unknown way he had secured, to his forehead and pulled the trigger.

The bullet entered the forehead and passed through the brain, lodging in the back of the neck, producing a fatal wound.

TERRAZAS AND WINN HAVE CONFERENCE

Governor's Son to Import Horses—Thinks We Need a Hotel.

Alberto Terrazas, most prominent promoter of the Juarez Jockey club, arrived Wednesday morning in El Paso from the city of Chihuahua. His arrival will be followed this afternoon by that of Matt Winn, of Louisville, general manager of the Juarez track.

"I am merely here to arrange for the importation of horses with the Mexican authorities," explained the jockey club president, at Hotel St. Regis. "Yes, Col. Winn is coming on the same ship. It is not to be a meeting of the board.

"We expect to have between 800 and 1000 horses at the track this year; that is, about double the number of the first season. Every prospect is good. "Hotel? Yes, I understand that one will be built in Juarez? Oh, no; here in El Paso. I know there is a movement to erect one in El Paso. I believe that both American and Mexican money is back of it, nothing more.

"Oh, yes, everything is quiet politically in Mexico. All of the good people, the ones that work, are very well satisfied."

COTTON

English Market Steady. Liverpool, Eng., Aug. 11.—There was only a fair demand for spot cotton in this market today. Sales amounted to but 4900 bales. Of this amount 3100 bales were for American account. Imports none. Spot prices were steady at an advance of 1/2 English points or 8 3/4 for American middling. In the future division, prices opened dull and unchanged, to one-half point higher. At 12:30 p. m. prices were quiet, unchanged to one point lower than the closing figures of the previous day. The market set quiet and steady throughout the session.

New Orleans Quiet. New Orleans, La., Aug. 11.—The opening of the local cotton market was steady at practically unchanged prices. During the morning quite heavy realizing sales and selling for further reaction in response to disappointing cables, and forecast for part cloudy weather in the western belt, were made. Selling was heavy in keeping with the rapidity of the recent advance, but there was continued demand on the scale down, as soon as scattered. Long interest had been somewhat reduced. The market was steadier by evening and renewed support, while aggressive selling for the short account was prevented by reports of continued good demand for spot cotton and the fact that rains in Texas were confined to the northern section of the state.

A general rain east of the river is needed and it is doubtful if the local showers give complete relief where they fall, because in most instances they are less than one inch. Some of the crop accounts from Georgia and the Carolinas are good. Others are poor, showing that the crop in those sections, as well as in the valley, is spotted.

RAILROAD NEWS. FREIGHT SERVICE FAST ON THE SOUTHWESTERN

Splendid Arrangement for Forwarding Shipments to the North.

The traffic department of the chamber of commerce in order to further its purpose of increasing the jobbing business of El Paso is endeavoring to improve merchandise service by the different lines diverging from this city, realizing that prompt and reliable service of a much importance in increasing the trade of any city as are freight rates.

The management of the El Paso & Southwestern system, which has always shown a willingness to inaugurate any reform that is consistent with business principles, in order to assist and strengthen the business interests of this city, has freely responded to the demand for improvement in the merchandise service for points north on the Alamo and Sacramento Mountain railway, is loaded in a car which is forwarded from this city each evening, reaching Alamo in time for early delivery the following morning and permitting freight for points on the Chiswick line to be forwarded the same forenoon. Freight for other points on this line south of Carrizozo is forwarded on the local train leaving El Paso each alternate day and is delivered at all points on that line. It is expected within very short time that this train will be run daily.

"It behooves the shippers of this city to increase the trade to points south of Carrizozo to such an extent that the company will be justified, in this change," says A. W. Reeves, traffic bureau manager.

A merchandise car is forwarded each evening loaded with freight for Carrizozo and Captain, reaching the former point at 5 o'clock the following morning. Freight for Captain and points on the railway reaching Carrizozo the following morning in time to make connections with the local train from that point and thereby allow freight for all points between Carrizozo and Duran to be delivered the day after delivery to the railway company here.

"This should prove to be a very satisfactory arrangement and the Southwestern system is entitled to the thanks of the shipping public for its efforts to encourage the jobbing business of this city," Mr. Reeves says.

There is one place where the service might be improved, that being freight for points between El Paso and Carrizozo—excepting Alamo—and just so soon as business improves to an extent whereby the company will be justified in doing so, the management will be only too glad to afford the city a daily service, it has assured Mr. Reeves.

CLUBHOUSE FOR RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

Southwestern Fits Up Its Old General Offices for Its Men.

The old general office building of the Southwestern on the corner of Campbell street and its tracks will be fitted up as a club building for its employees, at a cost of \$10,000.

Plans have been drawn and work on remodeling the building will begin in a few days. The first floor will be a bathroom, rest room and a bowling alley, and on the second floor will be a pool and billiard hall, a library and reading room.

There are 760 men on the Southwestern's pay roll, including the clerical forces in the general offices, who live in El Paso. There are no employees in the car repair department, but only a few of these are Americans and a large number of the employees in the boiler shops are Mexicans and negroes.
