A NEW ANTI-BAILEY LEADER RISES IN TEXAS.

San Antonio, Texas, Aug. 15.—Yancey Lewis of Dallas is now looming up in the public eye and indications point to him as the leader of the anti-Bailey forces two years from now in an effort to defeat United States senator Bailey for reelection. Judge Lewis has had a brilliant career, although a young man. He has been prominent in politics for many years but has never held an elective public office. The only public office he ever held was that of federal district judge, to which he was appointed for life by president Cleveland. He was the youngest man ever honored with such an office. He was located in the Indian Territory. The place was resigned by Judge Lewis to become professor of law in the University of Texas. After several years of service there he resigned to enter the practice of law at Dallas and has been so engaged ever since.

Tucumcari, N. M., Aug. 15.—About 2000 feet of track was rendered unusable during the hard rains, on the E. P. & S. W. between Montoya and Hanley. The wash was reported in time to prevent train 4, east bound, from attempting to cross. Train number 4, east bound, and number 3 and 33 west bound, were held until noon the next day and then allowed to pass, the track having been moved to one side onto some ground. Tucumcari was bombarded for nearly two hours by a terrific thunder storm, the hardest in many years. No damage of consequence has been reported, although telephone service is crippled. The newly formed lake east of town rose four inches higher and is now a body of water several feet deep, half a mile wide and nearly a mile and a half long.
