Santa Fe, N. M., August 17.—Word has been received in Santa Fe that third assistant postmaster general A. L. Lawshe, who came to New Mexico for his health a year ago and who had resigned his position with the postoffice department, but the resignation not being as yet accepted, has been tendered the place of Indian agent at Keams Canyon, on the Navajo reservation, Arizona, and is likely to accept the place.


