LAS CRUCES AND MESILLA VALLEY

NEW MEXICO SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GREAT

Territorial Superintendent Discusses Conditions in Las Cruces.

Las Cruces, N. M., Aug. 20.—Territorial school superintendent James E. Clark, while here yesterday made the statement that the public schools of New Mexico have improved more than 100 percent in the past three years. This has been brought about principally because of the fact that the different counties are employing a higher grade of teachers and paying salaries that induce a better class to come to New Mexico and remain. In addition to this phase of the situation, great strides have been made in a forward direction by the election of county school superintendents in the various counties, who are personally supervising the schools in their charge.

Mr. Clark has been through the northern end of the territory and is now on his trip of inspection through the southern and eastern districts. He says there has been great improvement in every county.

The English language is being taught to the Mexican children and they are being instructed in the various manual training. He says one drawback in this territory is the increase of marriages among the women teachers. As soon as one of the teachers begins to improve the condition of the school at which she is teaching, some one immediately lays siege to her heart and manages to induce her to retire from the profession.

But Mr. Clark believes that another five years will find the public schools equal to any in the states.

reservoir but did not reach far enough west to increase the five-tenths of a foot that had been flowing into the reservoir for several days. The flood that gave farmers along the Hondo river more water than they could use in irrigating was caused by a heavy rain on Rocky arroyo, which empties into the Hondo below the reservoir.

NEW COMPANY INCORPORATED. Las Cruces, N. M., Aug. 20.—Incorporation papers have been filed in San Antonio by the American National Realty company of Las Cruces and El Paso.
