### RAILROAD NEWS.

#### MEXICAN STATIONS WILL BE DECORATED

Orders Are Issued for Hanging of Bunting to Observe Centenary.

Orders have been received by local officials of the Mexican National railways from the general offices in Mexico City, to have the stations at Juarez decorated with bunting of the Mexican national colors in honor of the centennial celebration. Work on the decoration of the Juarez station has already begun. The El Paso ticket office of the company will also be decorated with bunting.

Every station on the lines of the Mexican National railways in the republic will be decorated with red, white and green, commemorating Mexico's centennial. As there are several thousand stations on the lines, the outlay for that purpose will be considerable. Although the cheap rates for the centennial will not be put on until September 1, the advance of visitors on the Mexican capital has already begun in a desultory way. El Paso being the principal gateway to the lower republic, it is expected that a large number of visitors from the United States and foreign countries will pass through this city en route to the capital of Mexico. The centennial begins September 15.

#### G. H. PARTICULAR ABOUT PRIVATE CARS

Refuses to Haul Buffalo Bill's Car on a Passenger Train Thursday.

The private car of the Buffalo Bill Wild West show, carrying the advance agent, has been refused passage over the G. H. on a passenger train. It has offered to carry the car on a freight train. The reason of the refusal is that the car is not up to the specifications adopted by the road as standard.

The private car "Julia" of a real estate concern of San Antonio was recently refused passage over a wooden platform, and it had to be detoured around by Newton, Kans., to reach San Antonio. The owners of the car took up the matter of the local officials' refusal with the general offices of the company, but their position was sustained.

### ROOSEVELT NOT A BUTCHER OF GAME

Naturalist Says Killing Was For Science Only—Great Danger.

Waverly, N. Y., Aug. 25.—J. Alden Loring, of Owego, N. Y., one of the field naturalists who accompanied the Roosevelt African expedition, delivered his first lecture, "Through Africa With Roosevelt," here last night as one of the attractions of the Old Home Week celebration. Mr. Loring covered the entire trip from Mombasa, British East Africa, to Gondokoro on the Nile, where the big game hunting practically ceased. After describing the habits of the natives and game, and relating many interesting experiences that he had various members of the party, the speaker said:

"Cal. Roosevelt and Kermit are two of the finest men to be with in camp that I have met. Their whole interest was for the good of the expedition and they added many rare animals to the collection simply because they were determined to make it as complete and valuable as possible. Although handicapped by poor weather, the expedition, he made many good shots and he made many poor ones, but as a whole his shooting was above the average."

**Roosevelt's Danvers.**  
"I do not think the counsel gives his readers a fair impression of the very great danger that he and Kermit were so often placed in. After we had said goodbye to four or five settlers with whom we had become acquainted, and met them again several weeks later I find one with a badly injured arm chewed by a leopard, a second in the hospital at the point of death from a lion mauling, and a third who exhibited a rent in a shirt made by the tusks of a charging elephant that killed his gun bearer; and after we had dined with a missionary one noon and learned of his death from fever the next day, we began to realize that hunting big game was not altogether a one-sided affair."

**Scientific Work Purely.**  
In substance Mr. Loring denied that the expedition was one of slaughter. He said that it was purely scientific; sent out by the Smithsonian Institution for the purpose of enriching the knowledge of science and to collect specimens of African animals. Ten times the amount of game could have been killed.

Already, over 25 animals new to science have been described, and when the entire collection has been worked up, many more will have been found. Not infrequently the government is compelled to close to travelers sections of the country where man-eating lions have suddenly appeared and are killing the natives or where a rogue rhinoceros or buffaloes tussled with their horns. These animals have to be killed before the region is again safe for travelers.

**Wild Game Bothers Natives.**  
Game is so abundant that barbed wire fences are broken down by zebras, wild beasts and antelopes and crops seriously damaged. The settlers encourage hunters, and if they had their own way, in a short time the vast herds of game that now roam over the plains would be greatly decreased.

### BANKER DIES SUDDENLY.

Waco, Tex., Aug. 25.—A telegram received here this morning told of the sudden death of A. C. McMahan, president of the First National Bank of Whitney, death occurring at Whitney last night. Heart failure is given as the cause. McMahan was 59 years of age and leaves several children.

Fireman Ware, Alderman McGhee also read the delinquent tax roll, totaling about 5 percent of the whole, or nearly \$25,000.

**Sewage Disposal Bids.**  
City clerk C. W. Fassett read a copy of an advertisement for bids for the construction of a garbage and sewage disposal plant, and this was approved. The clerk also reported that he had notified the telegraph, telephone and street car companies to place their wires underground within the next two years.

**Ordinances Held Up.**  
The ordinance creating a wholesale poultry district was deferred until next week.

The ordinance providing for prevention of fires was read a second time. It was referred to the city attorney for revision.

**Memorial Adopted.**  
Alderman McGhee presented a memorial of mayor Robinson, which was unanimously passed, mayor Kelly requesting that he be allowed to vote. Following is the memorial:

Whereas: On the morning of Aug. 14, 1910, in the falling ruins of the Buckler building, William F. Robinson, then mayor of El Paso, lost his life while warning firemen there on duty of a danger which threatened their lives;

And, whereas, such a deed and such a death would be made title by words unequal to their measure;

Therefore, be it resolved by the city council of the city of El Paso; That we enter upon our records this brief memorial of the cause and manner of Mr. Robinson's death in the hope that in its time of need El Paso will not lack a magistrate who with a like spirit but a better fortune, will furnish an equal example of self devotion.

Passed and approved this 25th day of August, 1910. C. E. Kelly, mayor.

**Petitions.**  
Residents living on Brown and Noble streets, north of Montana, asked that the grading be improved to prevent flood waters coming into the yards.

**The City's Health.**  
City health officer W. H. Anderson reported five cases of whooping cough, three of measles, five of typhoid.

There were four American births, 12 Mexican and one negro, a total of 17. Deaths to the number of 28 were reported, as follows: Americans 4, Mexicans 22, Polish 1, negro 1.

There were 219 inspections made of meat markets, 130 of dairies, 25 of slaughter houses, 60 of butchers and sixty-six cattle, five hogs, 34 sheep and 39 calves were inspected. There were 411 pounds of meat and 1235 pounds of fruit and vegetables condemned.

### EIGHT KILLED IN A COLLISION

neath the stalled engine were badly hurt.

Brakeman Graham, of the stalled train, declares he placed a torpedo on the tracks, and that the engine struck No. 4 paid no attention to it and went tearing along 40 miles an hour and ripped its way through the Pullman.

The engineer of No. 4 declares he was almost on No. 14 when the torpedo went off and that the latter train was carrying no tail lights.

The crew of No. 14, except the engineer, are said to have been hired during the recent strike and retained after the settlement.

No. 14, the Chicago-Montreal train, left Durand at 10:01 o'clock, but was stopped three miles east because of a breakdown of the engine. No. 4 left Durand, also eastbound, and crashed into the rear end of the standing train, splitting the rear sleeper in two and throwing its 18 passengers and bits of wreckage to each side of the right of way. Only one of the passengers, A. Davis Trenton, of Montreal, is thought to have escaped from the sleeper. His invalid mother and a brother, both of Montreal, were instantly killed.

George Wilson, fireman of No. 4, says his train had gathered full headway and was running more than 45 miles an hour when the accident occurred. He says there was no warning of the presence of No. 14, except one torpedo over which his engine passed a moment before the collision. Charles Spencer, engineer of No. 4, is thought to have been fatally hurt.

Engineer George Mitchell of the engine pulling No. 14, was under his broken engine making repairs when his train was struck and he was fatally hurt.

### WOODMEN OF WESTERN TEXAS HAVE LOG ROLLING

Stamford, Texas, Aug. 25.—The annual reunion of the West Texas Log Rolling association, composed of Woodmen of the World and their families, began here today and will continue during the week. Camps have been prepared for more than 500 families and the daily attendance is expected to be from 2000 to 3000.

This afternoon O. S. Lattimore, recently nominated by the Democrats of Fort Worth for state senator, will speak. Attorney general Lightfoot of Austin, head of the First National Bank of Dallas, and the World will speak Thursday. Other speakers will be Walter Morris of Albany, W. H. Muchison of Haskell, E. N. Kirby of Abilene, H. P. Grinstead of Eastland and Rev. J. T. Griswald of Stamford.

The meeting during the day will be open to the public. At night they will be in the old skating rink and only Woodmen can attend.
