RAILROAD NEWS.

SANTA FE MEN DUE HERE TODAY. Believed That Kouns Is to Succeed Hurley as General Manager.

A special Santa Fe train carrying J. W. Kendrick, vice president of the operating department of the Santa Fe Co., is expected to arrive in the city from the east Monday evening about 7 o'clock.

That Kouns is slated for the place of the late J. E. Hurley, general manager of the eastern lines, and that Fox will take Kouns's place as general manager of the western lines, is believed to be the significance of the visit of the officials.

The object of the trip over the eastern lines, and the fact that Kendrick is appointed to the position, is believed to be in line with the regular order of promotion, which is zealously followed by the road.

The appointment of Kouns as general manager of the eastern lines at Topeka, and Fox as general manager of the western lines at Amarillo, would create a vacancy in the office of the general superintendent, which would mean a number of promotions all along the line.

F. L. Meyers, superintendent of the Rio Grande division, is said to be slated for a promotion, as is superintendent Parker, of the Albuquerque division.

The officials' special train will be met at the union station this evening by the local Santa Fe officials.

MEXICAN GOVERNMENT TO BUY ANOTHER ROAD.

Paul Morton and Ambassador Thompson have set out to the National Railway of Mexico.

New York, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Official announcement is expected within the next few days of the sale to the National Railways of Mexico of the Pan-American railroad and of the Veracruz and Isthmus railroad.

The Pan-American railroad, which has been controlled by Paul Morton, president of the Equitable Life Assurance society; David E. Thompson, former United States ambassador to Mexico; and his associates.

The Veracruz line has been operated by the Mexican government. The first is capitalized at \$10,000,000, all issued, and bonded for \$8,000,000.

The second is capitalized at \$1,000,000, and the bonds are guaranteed by the Mexican government.

The National Railway of Mexico also are controlled through stock ownership by the government and the system's mileage by about 500 miles.
