Building Addition to High School—Progress on the New Courthouse.

Carrizozo, N. M., Sept. 2.—Work has been started on the new \$8000 addition to the Carrizozo high school. The contract calls for the completion of the building by January. In the meantime, additional room will have to be secured, as the schools now are very much overcrowded.

NEW STEAM PLOW IS RECEIVED AT ROSWELL

Automobile Company Equipped for Accidents; Lake Arthur Sold; Insurance Company Disbands.
Roswell, N. M., Sept. 2.—Josiah Graves has received a new 18 foot, 28 horse power steam plow with which he will break the 3000 acres of land on the Pecos river west of Roswell, which he bought of J. M. Miller.
Each car on the Roswell Auto company's main route between Roswell and Torrance now carries two extra rims, already equipped with casing and inflated inner tubes. In case of a blow-out one of these rims can be put on a wheel in five minutes.
T. Atkins, of Ramadell, Tex., who bought 1000 head of cattle in the neighborhood of Roswell at an average price of \$25 per head, has gone to El Paso.
The newly elected board of directors of the New Mexico National Life Insurance company, has been instructed by the stockholders to disincorporate and close up the business. The loss to the stockholders, it is stated, will be \$25,000. The company was organized here some months ago with a capital of \$150,000.
