GREAT CELEBRATION IN MEXICO THIS WEEK--THE BIG EVENT IN FRIDAY

Patriotic Demonstrations Take Up the Time of the People to the Exclusion of all Else--Juarez Is to Have Its Really Big Day on Sunday When Juarez Monument Is Dedicated--Mexico's Two Heroes.

Throughout the sister republic of Mexico Friday will be one of the biggest days in the peaceful history of the republic. It will commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the blow struck by Hidalgo, the priest, to break the bonds of Spanish oppression which fettered the people of Mexico; but not only will Hidalgo, "the Washington of Mexico," be honored; Benito Juarez, "the Lincoln of Mexico," will receive equal praise and his many monuments and statues will be unveiled to the one as the other.

While Hidalgo led the first movement and threw off the Spanish yoke, Juarez led another just as important but a century later, and drove off the foreign usurper, who had once more locked the shackles of oppression about the wrists of Mexican liberty.

From dawn to dusk the people of Mexico will celebrate on Friday. Organizations of men, bands of children, and files of soldiers will parade, flags will wave, cannon will roar through the national anthem and the echo will roll out from the mountains and across the ocean to tell to the world that Mexico appreciates her liberty and is proud of her rank among the republican institutions of the world.

Soldiers will march from plaza to bull ring, from bull ring to monument, from monument to school, and back again until their tired feet will ache, their glistening bayonets will cease to glisten under the sheath of dust, and their perspiration soaked uniforms are wet; but it will be a show that the Mexican people will remember. The people on the sidewalks will cheer; those in the houses will applaud; it will be inspiring to the young and interesting to the old; it will make them forget most things and feel less harshly those they do not forget. All will be gay, happy in their own particular way, and it will be a great day for Mexico.

In Juarez it will not be as great a day as Sunday, for the big monument, a nation's tribute to a hero, will not be unveiled until Sunday. The statue to Benito Juarez, soldier, statesman and patriot, is completed and ready for the dedication, but the governor must dedicate other public and patriotic enterprises on Friday; he must be in the state capital on the national independence anniversary, and he must wait, but he will be here Sunday and then the monument will be officially dedicated. Erected by popular subscriptions, headed by president Porfirio Diaz, president of the nation, with \$1,000,000 in gold, a ribbon which the monument cost, was raised from the dollars and dimes of the general populace and is a free will offering, a nation's tribute of gratitude. It is built at the junction of the road to the country that all liberty lovers may see for her heroes; that Mexico is a liberty loving country and pays tribute to a son who led it out of the wilderness of despair into the highway of hope and liberty; from out the grasp of the monarch into the clear light of republicanism.

Mexico's Two Great Heroes. And Mexico has in her two greatest heroes, two of the greatest national characters the world has ever known. Juarez, the man of humble origin, elevated to the presidency, then driven from office by the royalists and into poverty and want, proved himself in many respects a soldier as great as Grant, a leader as gentle as Lincoln and a man of the courage of Washington. Broken and alone, without funds and surrounded only by a few faithful as he lingered in the city of Dolores, Paso del Norte, opposite El Paso, he never despaired; he planned and hoped always to drive the enemy from the country and finally, after appealing to the United States for aid and making several unsuccessful efforts to start back to Mexico City with his army, he finally succeeded and had the satisfaction of seeing the republic reestablished, although the presidency was soon wrested from him by soldiers younger and bolder, including the present venerable president, then a young republican.

Hidalgo, the priest, who threw off the Spanish yoke at the cost of his own life, like Juarez, who came later, did not live to taste the fruits of success. But today Mexico reveres and all the world honors Cura D. Miguel Hidalgo y Castilla, priest and revolutionist. He was born at Corralejo, studied at Valladolid, Mexico, and was given charge of the parish of Dolores, in the state of Guanajuato. Dissatisfied with the government, he conspired with the Indians to raise a tax revolt, but his plan on November 1, 1810. Fear of discovery led him to hasten his plans and the revolt began in September in the town of Dolores. His eloquence had a powerful effect on the people, and to withstand the government's attempt to aloft the banner of Our Lady of Guadalupe, patron saint of Mexico, and gave to his insurrection the character of a crusade. He took the towns of Guanajuato and Comanja, and with an army of 50,000 men marched on Mexico, defeating on the way a small force of soldiers sent to oppose him. But the pope's decree of excommunication launched his army against him, and the government's army, under the command of the viceroy, defeated him on the 30th of September. He was killed on the 30th of September by the onset of 6000 Spanish

RAILROAD MAN FROM CASAS GRANDES IN JAIL Held Because His Pistol Was Discharged in a Restaurant; Man Who Says He is Related to a General.

H. F. Foster, a railroad man from Casas Grandes, Mexico, who was arrested Monday night on the charge of carrying a pistol and rudely displaying a pistol, was transferred to the county jail Tuesday night, information having been filed against him in the county court. Judge Lea dismissed the charge pending against Foster in police court. According to witnesses, Foster's revolver was discharged in the Club House cafe on El Paso street early Tuesday morning. He was accompanied by a woman.

J. Russell, a railroad man arrested Monday afternoon on the charge of fighting, was fined \$20 in police court Tuesday afternoon. C. W. Davison, with whom Russell was fighting, was dismissed.

E. C. Collins, charged with drunkenness, and who, while on the witness stand stated that he was related to Gen. D. T. Stafford of Louisiana, and that a cousin of his was employed in a local national bank, was fined \$3. Collins, while on the witness stand, also said that he had about seven or eight drinks, not all exactly whisky, and that he was unable to estimate his capacity.

Vashtila Dolling, charged with drunkenness and using abusive language was fined \$5, which she paid.

NEW YORK BANK MULCTED OF BIG SUM. Reported That a Man Got the Money on Insufficient Securities and a False Statement of Credit.

New York, N. Y., Sept. 14.—The financial district and the district attorney's office are much stirred by reports that a down town bank was mulcted out of between \$25,000 and \$100,000. The man accused of the alleged larceny is known and under surveillance.

As far as could be learned, the money involved was procured on loan from the bank through the alleged use of insufficient securities and of false statements of credit.

Willis G. Nash, president of the Mercantile National bank, admitted that his bank was the one that had made the complaint to the district attorney. In a formal statement regarding the matter he said:

"There is an uncovered balance due of about \$34,000. We expect to hold responsible for the balance a German merchant and banking house reputed to be very wealthy and highly honorable. The accused party was the duly accredited agent of this German firm and it is therefore responsible for his acts."

U. S. MAY ATTEMPT TO PUNISH ZELAYA. May Ask Nicaraguan Government to Extradite Him and Try Him for Executing Greece and Cannon.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 14.—Thomas G. Dawson, newly appointed minister to Panama, has been designated as a commissioner to proceed forthwith to Managua. Mr. Dawson has for several years been at the head of the Latin American bureau of the state department and had much experience as a minister in Spanish-American countries. He sails from New York for Panama and will make his way northward from that point.

Commissioner Dawson is going to confer with president Estrada regarding the punishment of the persons who were responsible for the killing of Greece and Cannon. There has been an application by Estrada to the Belgian government for the extradition of ex-president Zelaya and in case that application were granted he would probably come in for severe treatment at home.

ENGLISHMAN WINS THE AVIATION PRIZES. Claude Graham-White Captures All the Big Events at Boston--Is Challenged by Curtiss for a Race.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 14.—Claude Graham-White, of England, flying a Farman biplane and a Bleriot monoplane, both equipped with a French motor, proved himself the champion of the first annual Harvard-Boston aero meet at the close of the nine days' competition last night, having won the blue ribbon event of the meet, the Boston Globe prize of \$10,000 for his harbor flight to Boston light and return.

He took altogether four first places and three seconds in different events, winning \$22,100 in money. No person was injured during the meet and there was less than \$500 damage to any machine.

Englishman to a match race. Ralph Johnstone got three first prizes and one second, which netted him \$5000; Walter Brooks took in \$4250 on two first places, a second and a third, and \$2000 on the second and third place in speed and \$2000, while Chas. Willard won \$50 for second place in "get away."

Practically all the amateur prizes were won by Clifford B. Harmon, of New York, who flew the Farman biplane.

MILWAUKEE DOCTOR FACES GIRL'S SERIOUS CHARGE

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 14.—A warrant was last night issued for the arrest of Dr. Wm. Colby Rucker, health commissioner of Milwaukee, on a complaint charging a statutory offense. The complainant is Miss Catherine Hasdorff, a domestic employed in a grand avenue home.

Dr. Rucker was in the United States public health and marine hospitals for a number of years. He was granted a year's leave of absence from the government soon after Mayor Seldel went into office, the mayor having chosen him for head of the Milwaukee health department after canvassing the country thoroughly for a competent health official.

Rucker was assigned by the government to service at New Orleans during a yellow fever epidemic and at San Francisco when bubonic plague threatened that city.

Mayor Seldel received and accepted Rucker's resignation.

While Dr. Rucker says that he has no doubt but that he will be vindicated in court yet he feels that it is his duty to resign to save mayor Seldel any embarrassment pending the settlement of the charge.
