FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC DOMAIN SURVEYS.
Surveys in Arizona in Future to Be Under Supervision of General's Supervision.

Tombstone, Ariz., Oct. 14.—The surveyors of this city have received advice from the surveyor general that he has been informed by the department at Washington that a fund of \$10,000 is available for the purpose of making surveys of the public domain in Arizona under a new system which has been adopted.

The surveyor general states that contract systems have been abolished and that surveys will in the future be made under the surveyor general's office by government surveyors. One of the advantages urged in favor of the new system is that it will abolish the delays which have heretofore obtained under the old system of making bids for surveys and the awarding of contracts. The adoption of the new system, states the surveyor general, creates a demand for government surveyors, and an examination for eligibles will be had in Phoenix in the near future.

TO EXTEND ROAD TO FOOT OF MOUNTAINS

Pecos Valley Southern May Reach Projected Terminus by Dec. 1.

Pecos, Texas, Oct. 14.—W. L. Carville, president of the Pecos Valley Southern railroad, is in Pecos, in connection with the extension of his railroad south from Saragosa to Balmorhea. It is announced that the line will be immediately constructed to Balmorhea, and from that town to a point five miles south of there at the foot of the Davis mountains.

The rails for this additional construction work were shipped from Illinois week before last, and are expected in Pecos almost any day. The ties, which were ordered from Louisiana, are also on their way here. It is the intention of president Carville and associates to have the line extended not only to Balmorhea, but to the Davis mountains, the southern projected terminus of the road, by December 1, this year.

This line of railroad, for the construction of which the citizens of Pecos gave an outright bonus of \$100,000, has been running trains into Saragosa for the past several weeks, and a very nice town has been built up at Saragosa. However, owing to various and unavoidable delays, the road has not yet been able to get into Balmorhea, a town which is the center of activities in the irrigated districts, at the foot of the Davis mountains.

The charter of the Pecos Valley Southern railroad calls for a terminus at either Marfa or Alpine, and it is understood that a survey has been made to cross the Davis mountains, and one or the other of the two Southern Pacific points will be made the terminal point of that end of the line.

DALHART MAY GET ANOTHER RAILROAD

Hereford & Gulf to Run There—Many Land Seekers Coming From North.

Dalhart, Texas, Oct. 14.—Dalhart is to have an additional railroad, making five in all. The Commercial club is in possession of information that the Hereford & Gulf will extend to Dalhart in the near future. Representatives of that company are now in the field securing right of ways leading to Dalhart.

E. D. Kelly, manager of the Southwestern Land company here, says he has information from 75 of his agents throughout the northern and eastern states that more landseekers will visit this part of the country this fall and winter than ever before.

A wagon load of white yams, grown near Dalhart, was retailed at 4 cents per pound, finding ready sale. The peculiar feature is their great size, some weighing 10 1/2 pounds. Grown under natural conditions and without irrigation.

OUTPUT OF SUGAR FACTORY IS FIFTY THOUSAND BAGS.
Tombstone, Ariz., Oct. 14.—The entire run of the Arizona beet sugar factory at Glendale was well granulated and is satisfactory. Fifty thousand bags of sugar were made this year,

of which 8000 bags have already been sold. The run lasted two months and the 50,000 bags will more than supply the territory for the year. It is therefore necessary to seek a market outside for the sugar and this was one of the reasons for the testing of the sugar in syrups, so that it can be put in direct competition with the cane sugar wherever that may be found.
The entire output of the factory is in every way good sugar and the run this year may be said to be the most successful the factory has ever had.

FINDS ANCIENT RUINS IN MARSHAL PASS COUNTRY.
Dr. Fewkes Says They Are Probably 500 Years Old and Are Well Preserved.

Tombstone, Ariz., Oct. 14.—Dr. J. W. Fewkes, well known in Tombstone and the southwest, has returned to Flag-

staff from a trip of over 200 miles to the Marshal Pass country. The doctor is connected with the Smithsonian institute at Washington. In describing the new wonders, he says that they are among the largest and most perfectly preserved ruins of the ancient race in the southwest, and he estimates they are approximately 500 years old. One mammoth cave has an opening of about 600 feet in front and extends back into the cliff about 100 feet or more.

The cave contains from 75 to 100 rooms, all built of adobe brick. The bricks are made of mud and straw and are about two feet long and four inches thick. Altogether there are over 14 separate and distinct two story houses of this kind, and only one which was built of rock.
