### The Bremerton Navy Yard

Where Many American War Vessels Go for Repairs and Some To Pass from Activity To Training Ship Obscurity.

Bremerton, Wash., Oct. 21.—A warship with a shingle roof and bay windows is one of the very interesting sights of the government navy yard at this point. It is the first class cruiser Philadelphia that was converted into a training ship for young sailors and now out of active commission. Save for its guns, this boat is in the same condition as when it sailed the waters, only that another story has

been built on it, a shingle roof has been put on this story and the walls have been built up of plank. Where the guns were operated out of turrets on the side, bay windows have now been constructed. All this woodwork could be stripped off in a very few hours and the ship put again into fighting trim, but this will never be done, as the Philadelphia, a few years ago one of the nation's prides, is now of the obsolete type, and it will probably never again see any active service save that of training young sailors the art of sailing without sailing. They are brought aboard this ship and taught to splice rope, are instructed in the routine of the daily life of a salt water man and learn how to refer to the different parts of the ship without saying "the back end," "downstairs," "the front," "the left side," and so forth. As the ship has all its machinery aboard, the young sailors learn everything regarding a warship on board this training

ing vessel, and then go out on "the briny deep" to start again sailing. The Philadelphia is not the only boat once the pride of the American people that is now out of use at this yard. The Boston, second class cruiser, a trim, beautiful little vessel that is said to have fired the first shell at Manila, lies idly at anchor with only a caretaker on board and the ignominious consequences of being sold staring her in the face. Alongside is the Concord, a gunboat that won fame, and it also is soon to be sold. The Boston and Concord are no longer of any value to Uncle Sam in this day of dreadnaughts. They will be sold to some enterprising freighter or some South American or West Indian republic.


**The Oregon Undergoes Repairs.**  
The famous old Oregon, once "the bulldog of the American navy," is now in dock getting an overhauling that is costing about \$2,000,000, and she will go into commission again next spring, and make another trip around the Horn and up the Atlantic coast, as she did when she sailed around and took a crack at Cervera in 1898.

The Charleston, fast scout cruiser and commerce destroyer, beautiful in her white coat, has just come in from Asiatic waters and will be repaired before she goes out again. The Milwaukee and St. Louis, of the type, though smaller than the Concord, close to the Concord and Boston, painted a dull gray and only a shipkeeper aboard. They are not needed now, and as Uncle Sam has a dearth of sailors, they are waiting until they are needed. The Galveston and Chattanooga, twin cruisers, still painted in the white coat they wore at sea, lie also in the basin; and at the dock, consigned to the service of the state naval reserves of Washington, lies the monitor Chevreton, once the Wyoming before a big battleship was built and named for Wyoming. To the real salt water sailor, a boat could undergo no more ignominious end than assignment to the naval militia. This boat is in the care of sailors of the regular navy at dock, but the militia has practice drills on board and once a year sails out on the ill-named "placid" waters of the Pacific and gets very seasick. The caretakers now on the ship talk sarcastically of how the whole crew was on hands and knees by the time the boat rounded Cape Flattery on the last cruise of the militia and declare that the militia captain who commanded after he got over his sick spell, became such a thorough sailor that on his return home he hired a negro to throw water against his house at night so he could sleep.

**Was in Samoan Disaster**  
Probably the most interesting boat in the navy yard is the Nipise, the great Samoan disaster of the early eighties and was among "the flower of the navy" at that time. Its old wooden hull with a moss-covered roof and barred windows now houses the men who fracture the rigid rules of discipline for men who sail the sea for Uncle Sam.

The navy yards are beautiful and the parades of the marines are daily features that attract many visitors. The big 12-inch guns that have been replaced on the Oregon by the more deadly 12 1/2-inch type are also a matter of curiosity and interest. The Oregon is getting, among other improvements, one of the new steel fighting masts, made of a network instead of solid steel, and is the first to be so equipped on the Pacific coast. This type of fighting mast was decided upon after a test a year ago in which the monitor Florida was actually fired upon by other ships of the navy with big shells.

**Officers Have Golf Links.**  
The officers of the navy yard have a beautiful golf course in the grounds and many visitors are permitted to play. In fact, it is open to the public after a permit is granted by the commanding officer, as some regulation must be exercised. The navy yard is located in an arm of Puget sound, heavily defended by several forts and marked batteries and no navy in the world could reach it and accomplish any destruction. One dry dock is in use and a second—the largest in the world—is in course of construction. A floating crane of 200
