PINCHOT'S CREED IS MADE PUBLIC

 protection, instruction, and assistance rather than less.
 "I believe that the people of the United States have the right, and can be trusted, to decide and direct how their own property and their own affairs shall be handled."
 "I believe that the people have rights in all natural resources even when privately owned, and that these resources must be managed and used not for private advantage alone, but likewise so as to promote and not to endanger the common good. Those which still remain in the hands of the

people should be developed and administered for the benefit of us all.
 "I believe that no man has a right to waste or freely monopolize any necessary of life, like coal, oil, timber, or water power; and that the people have the right and the duty to prevent the wasteful or destructive use of any natural resource."
 "I believe that this should be a government by men for human welfare, and not a government by money for profit; and that it is better to help a poor man make a living than to help a rich man make more money."
 "The foregoing statement is not my own confession of belief. I concur in it, but it does not cover all the ground of my political creed. For example, I believe in the principle of the initiative and referendum, but in my judg-

ment the people of the United States have not yet reached a conclusion upon that point. So with the short ballot; the commission form of government for cities, and many other questions. I have not attempted to state my own platform, but rather the position which I believe the largest number of voters throughout the country hold today."
TRYING TO REMOVE MAR CHEW TO CRUCES
 Before United States commissioner George B. Oliver, the government is attempting to remove Mar Chew to Las Cruces, N. M., for trial on the charge of conspiring to smuggle Chinese into the United States. He was indicted on the charge by the grand jury at Las Cruces nearly three years ago.
 The case has been heard twice be-

fore in the commissioner's court. After the first trial the case was remanded to the commissioner for retrial and after the second hearing the order of removal was overruled by Judge Maxey. The government is making a strong attempt at this hearing to strengthen its case.
 H. D. Maynard, who was convicted of conspiracy in the same connection and has served a term in the federal penitentiary, was on the stand for the government Friday and said that he was under agreement to transport the aliens to Albuquerque over the Santa Fe, on which he was employed, for which service he was to be paid \$250 per head.
 Fred O. Wiles, who was on the stand Friday, was recalled Saturday morning by the government. On cross examination by Richard Burges,

attorney for Mar Chew, Wiles denied that he had ever received \$600 at one time, \$600 at another and \$500 at another for smuggling Chinamen in 1908. The witness grew indignant and intimated that it would not be well for the attorney to say such things outside the courtroom.
 Wiles said he had heard Mar Chew say he had 400 Chinamen, over the river that he wanted brought over, also that there was a shack down the river on the Mexico side where there were 75 Chinamen to be brought over.
 After the examination of Wiles, the hearing was adjourned until 9:30 Monday morning.
