BISBEE AWAITING COMING OF THOMAS

Will Entertain Visiting Officer and Boost Army Post Movement.

Bisbee, Ariz., Nov. 2.—Gen. Earl D. Thomas, who is in Arizona on a tour of inspection, is expected in Bisbee in a few days, at which time prominent citizens will entertain him and will urge the establishing a military garrison here.

The local telephone service is being inspected by general manager Morris of the Tri-State Telephone and Telegraph company. It is reported that the company will spend \$20,000 in improvements in this district.

James McDonald, street superintendent, will henceforth perform the duties of sanitary inspector, the latter position having been abolished by the council.

George Buxton has tendered his resignation as president of the local board of trade, as his business interests in California require his continuous presence there. While away he will continue to be a partner of the Buxton-Smith company of Bisbee.

The city reservoir is being inspected by representatives of two insurance companies. It is believed that after their reports reach the home offices a reduction in insurance rates will be made.

DE RUDIO, SOLDIER OF FORTUNE, DIES

Was Aid to Garibaldi and Sentenced for Plot to Kill Napoleon.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 2.—Maj. Charles De Rudio, United States army, retired, a noted soldier of fortune, once an aid on the staff of Garibaldi, and one of the nine men sentenced to death for the attempt upon the life of Napoleon III, and pardoned by empress Eugenie, died at his home in this city of heart disease.

At the age of 18, educated for his chosen calling in a military school of Austria, De Rudio was an aid on the staff of Garibaldi before he had arrived at his 20th year. At the age of 25 he was one of the nine chosen by the ill-fated Felice Orsini for the revolutionary coup planned against the life of Napoleon III. In Paris, June 18, 1858.

His comrades were guillotined and himself under sentence of death, young De Rudio calmly smoked a cigar and awaited the execution. At the last moment a messenger arrived with a royal pardon from the hand of the empress Eugenie, who had been moved to clemency by the intercession of queen Victoria of England, in answer to the pleadings of De Rudio's English wife.

De Rudio came to the United States six years later and enlisted in the Union army as a private in company A of the 79th New York infantry in 1864. He was commissioned a second lieutenant by Gen. Grant.

In command of a detachment of the second infantry, he served through the reconstruction period of the south, and later was with the seventh cavalry at Fort Lincoln during the Indian rising in Dakota. As a first lieutenant he took part in the campaigns of Gen. Custer and at the time of the battle of the Little Big Horn he commanded a part of the left wing of the troops under Reno.

De Rudio was made a captain in the seventh cavalry in 1883 and retired at Fort Bayard, N. M., in 1896, but became a major in 1904, after retirement. He was once stationed at San Antonio, Texas.

WINKLER GRAND JURY RETURNS ONE INDICTMENT.

Kermit, Tex., Nov. 2.—At the recent term of the Winkler county district court, the grand jury, after being in session three days, returned one bill of indictment for assault with intent to murder, and adjourned for the term. There were only two civil cases on the docket, both of which were tried and finally disposed of by Judge Isaacs.

Winkler county will have a new

court house, bonds of the county for that purpose having already been voted by the taxpayers of the county, only one vote being cast against the issuance of bonds.

There are over 700 sections of state school lands in Winkler county, every section of which, except four or five worthless ones, has been sold to actual settlers.

Assessor of taxes Jim Payne has completed his first tax rolls for Winkler county, which shows the property valuation of the county to be \$1,250,740. This valuation does not include the townsite of Kermit and Duval, which have been laid out since January 1, 1910, and not subject to taxation as such for this year.

Commissioner's court has had a new public road laid out from Kermit to the county line, in the direction of Monahan.

The department at Washington has discontinued the postoffice at Duval and extended the mail line from Poyote to Kermit, and has ordered all mail matter addressed to Duval sent to Kermit for delivery.

The postoffice department at Washington has been petitioned to increase the mail schedule between Kermit and Poyote from a semi-weekly to a daily, and senator Bailey and Cecil Lyons are using their influence for the increase.

Miss Eliza Moreland is now first assistant in the Kermit postoffice.

Kermit needs a bank, there being none in Winkler county, and the commissioner's court, under the state depository law, was forced to go out of the county to find a depository for the county funds.

County treasurer Withers has this week received from comptroller Stephens a draft for \$2000, money collected on nonresident taxes before the county was organized.

Several cattle buyers have been in Kermit this week, among them Cape Williamson, of El Paso. They all want fat calves for shipment to the market and are paying good prices for them.

Commissioner's court has contracted the sale of the four leagues of school lands ceding to Winkler county to Henry Sayles, Jr., of Abilene. The sale was made on 40 years' credit with the interest payable annually, which will furnish money for four nine months in the year public schools, without having to levy any special taxes.

The Kermit Townsite company has engaged Little & Little, civil engineers, to survey and plat the "southside addition" to the town of Kermit, which consists of 480 acres of land, beautifully situated and will be the principal residence portion of the town.

Henry Hutchinson, of New Mexico, who has been down with typhoid fever at the home of his brother, G. W. Hutchinson, in Kermit, nearly two months, is reported to be no better and his friends are becoming alarmed over his condition.
