

CLIFTON OFFERS COURTHOUSE SITE

Citizens of That Town Believe They Will Land County Seat.

Clifton, Ariz., Nov. 8.—Clifton sprang the trump card in the county seat fight with Duncan when a petition, signed by a number of property holders and prominent local business men, guaranteeing a court house site for the new county, was made public.

Before the primary elections Duncan had three tracts of land offered for the courthouse site. This has been one of the chief arguments advanced in favor of Duncan, but now Clifton has not only guaranteed the site for the public buildings free of charge, but is leaving the selection of the location to the county supervisors.

The new county of Greenlee will embrace one of the most fertile farming districts in the Gila valley, as well as one of Arizona's best mining districts. The natural wealth of the county is equal to any in the territory and it is probably the only one that combines rich farming and mining sections, and will take its place among the leading counties of the new state.

Clifton, located in the heart of the mining district, and Duncan, the center of the farming section, have been having a running fight for the courthouse ever since the passage of the county division bill. The indications today seem to favor Clifton for the final choice, although the fight promises to be a close one.

The election, being the only one in the territory, will be watched with the keenest interest to determine the trend of politics in the new state. This will also be the last county election in Arizona territory, as the statehood bill provides that all county officers hold over until the state organization is perfected.

DITCH TRANSFER IS LIKELY TO BE MADE

Tularosa, N. M., Nov. 8.—Ex-governor George Curry, acting as agent for John H. Riley, has made a proposition to the Tularosa Community Ditch corporation, involving the transfer of the Riley holdings in the canyon.

The water right owners appear favorably disposed toward the latter's offer and it is considered probable that the transfer will be made. This will mean an increase in Tularosa's irrigated district of from 500 to 1000 acres.

Nogales, Ariz., Nov. 8.—News comes from Guaymas that eight officers were poisoned by eating spoiled fish on board the steamer Transit. The steamer was en route from Guaymas to Carmen island and had to return for medical aid so violently ill did the officers become.

EFFORT TO BURN FORMER HOME OF A MANUFACTURER

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 8.—For the second time within a week, fire nearly destroyed a house which until 10 days ago belonged to Felix J. Zeehandelaar, secretary of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association. On the day that the plant of the Los Angeles Times was destroyed a bomb was found at Zeehandelaar's home.

Mrs. Elda Cloud and her 7-year-old son, who were the only occupants of the house yesterday, narrowly escaped from the flames, which started some time after midnight in the cellar.

H. Hinkley, who bought the place from Zeehandelaar, says that he found in the cellar the remains of a feather bed which he believes had been placed there by incendiaries.

SEND HOSPITAL PATIENTS TO THE COUNTY POOR FARM

Tombstone, Ariz., Nov. 8.—County patients here will probably be transferred to the county poor farm at Douglas on December 1. It is expected that the county supervisors will take action ordering this when they meet on Nov. 21. There are at present 100 patients in the hospital here.

CANANEA MAN ENDS LIFE WITH PISTOL

Despondent and Ill, He Commits Suicide; Leaves Los Angeles Fiancée.

Cananea, Son, Mex., Nov. 8.—E. J. Houston, aged about 27 years, committed suicide by shooting himself through the heart dying instantly. He committed the act on the front steps of the three story brick rooming house of the Four C's company.

Houston used a .45 calibre Colt's, which he had borrowed from an acquaintance during the afternoon, giving as his reason that he had a bet that he could borrow a gun by nightfall.

At about 6:30 he ate his dinner at the Cananea club rooms, after which he wrote a number of letters. The latter were found in a pocket of his coat after he was dead. They were addressed to Charles Wright, E. Simpson, J. Corhill, Fred Nichols and C. E. Miner. The contents were in the same strain, the deceased giving as his reason that he was too weak to fight life's battle; that he had at last found his groove and that he had always played square with "the boys." He asked that his fiancée, who is in Los Angeles at present, be told that he had done the best thing and that she should forget him, the sooner the better.
